


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



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As is evident, Ron has a creative mind but he cannot be the only one in our Division. So if you have an idea, please email it to me.



FEBRUARY 7, 2017

Steve provided copies of revised Division By-Laws for board members to review at home. Discrepancies should be noted by Friday. Steve will have Ben Lanza post on the website at that time for member review.

Bruce Bowie announced his plan to encourage article submission to The Flatwheel by issuing credit for regular meeting raffle tickets - tentatively a \$1 credit for a small article and a \$5 credit for a large article. Bruce displayed samples of the "Raffle Bucks". Raffle Chair Mike Klein has approved the idea and will work with Bruce on implementation. Motion made to approve by John Hemsath and seconded by Jim Moore. Unanimous approval.





I'd also like to remind the winners of the January contest to bring their models back for show and tell.





ORIGINS OF THE ENGINEER'S CAP

There's something almost magical about sliding on that blue and white striped hat. Perhaps it reminds you of countless hours of operating trains on your first layout. Maybe it brings back memories of running trains with a grandfather who also wore a similar hat. But underneath the nostalgia is a very practical beginning.

The origins of the traditional engineer's cap began with George "Stormy" Kromer, an engineer for the Chicago and North Western Railroad and a semi-famous, semiprofessional baseball player. Stormy would wear his baseball cap while working at the controls of locomotive. However, day after day his hat would keep flying off when he would stick his head out of the cab. He tried all different types of caps, but nothing fit his needs.

One day in 1903, George went home and relayed his frustration about his cap to his wife. They pooled their ideas and formulated the design for what we now know as a railroad engineer's cap.

George's wife, Ida, was an expert seamstress. She create George's new cap from what she had around the house: blue and white pinstripe ticking. Pinstripe pillow ticking was readily available cheap to come by. Besides a commonly used being material, there was another reason as to why Ida used ticking to create pillow The fabric George's cap. weave on the ticking was thicker so the feathers inside the pillow wouldn't poke through. Railroaders preferred this material to traditional fabrics because it prevented embers from the firebox from



lot to offer. Ben Franklin has a nice supply N, HO and Lionel products. Engines, freight cars, passenger cars and building kits are part of the stocked train section.




Scenery products, accessories, tools, wiring supplies and detail parts all are on the racks at Ben Franklin. The

THE BYLINE...

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This month we'll discuss bridges. Most people when they design a layout, they usually add a design element that includes a bridge. In this case, my layout required a 24" wide lift-out-section to access my electrical box. I envisioned a double track bridge with short abutments; in total the plan called for three bridges in this 24" space. Obviously, when I designed this area I had visions of grandeur; and now that I'm laying track the reality is setting in.

However, I really wanted a truss bridge for this area and there weren't any available in a twenty four inch length. Central Valley brought out a nice double track bridge a couple of years ago, but for my application, I would have to shorten it by just over four inches.

In September my Walthers monthly flyer came and I noticed that they were coming out with a 23 inch Arched Pratt Truss Bridge. It was scheduled for an October 1st release. None of the dealers had them yet at our show, but a few days after, one was shipped to my house. It's a large kit. When I opened the box I thought wow what did I just do!



So I built it: The instructions are on one double sided, 8.5x11 sheet. Assembling the trusses was the first step. I cut the four core truss pieces from their sprues

and set them on the glass plate on my workbench. The glass plate kept them flat while gluing them together. Each truss has about 30 lacing sections to be added to form the girders. Each evening I would add between 5 and 10 lacings and the fourth night I finished the first truss. Meanwhile, while glue was drying, I read the deck assembly instructions a few times and studied the drawings. By the time I finished the second truss I had



a good understanding of the deck assembly and how the trusses and top girders went together. I formed a plan for keeping everything square and in three weeks

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the 23x5x5.25" bridge was finished! I found building it in small sections very relaxing & fun! If you have any interest in a bridge this size the kit is available in both single and double track versions. The design of the model is excellent and the parts fit together nicely.

Now if you read carefully, you're thinking Gary said he had a 24 inch space and built a 23 inch bridge. So how did he make up the one inch?

Next month: homemade bridge abutments from dimensional lumber.

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

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
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NEW SHOW!!



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


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DIVISION 4, MCR, NMRA
