The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A



Last month I wrote about making changes to our layouts to improve them. I used my good friend Jim Moore as an example of someone unafraid to make significant changes to his layout in order to improve its performance.

After moving into our current and much smaller home, I developed plans for my new railroad. And again when I called upon my crew for help, our resident artist filled the sky with clouds. Then Friday nights came and the crew once again showed up. In short order we built the structure and installed the power distribution system. But they moved so fast I did not have a track plan ready so I had to lay them off. Sorry guys.

## I HATE LAYING TRACK!

Since then I developed the track plan and started laying track. I did not get far before the work stalled out. I told myself, the crew, and anyone who asked, it was because I HATE laying track (not a good thing when your hobby is model railroading!)! This was/is true.

But I now know there was something else tugging at my subconscious. The design included a 5' wide by 12' long mobile section that rolled out and over to connect to the peninsula jutting out from the right hand side. This allowed me to squeeze into the garage the maximum benchwork while still allowing two vehicles to park in the garage. Sad to say but my wife and I are too spoiled at our advanced age to park our primary vehicles outside!

This design feature was good in theory but posed what turned out to be a significant drawback. If I wanted to work on the layout, I needed to back both vehicles out of the garage. I know, this doesn't seem to be a big deal. But just lets say when one is already dreading performing the work to be done, like laying track, one (ME) doesn't need a lot of reasons to procrastinate. And if you want to work on the layout for just a little while, it is also a large rock in your path.

## CHANGE CAN REINVIGORATE YOUR HOBBY INTEREST

So taking my own advice, I am in the process of making a BIG change. I am lowering the entire layout structure in order to have the added height needed to build a second level fed by a helix. This eliminates the movable section.

And yes, I know about the negatives to two level layouts but believe they will be outweighed by my ability to work on the layout without the need to move any vehicles out of the garage be it for 30 minutes, or all day Sunday.

So to my crew; Jim Moore, Gary Dunn, George Keller, Fred Wagner and others, I apologize for your time spent helping build version 1.0 and hope you will respond again when asked to help with version 2.0.

PS - I can add that clearing the layout of tools, supplies and other paraphernalia can improve the likelihood work will

commence. Try it!

## GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

## OCTOBER 13TH, 2017 CHURCH OF THE REDEEMER, WESTLAKE OH

Superintendent Steve Kaplan brought the meeting to order at 7:32 pm and welcomed all in attendance.

Gary Shaefer, reporting for membership, said that there were no new members. Visitors introduced themselves at Gary's request. Gary thanked everyone who assisted at the membership table during the Train Show.

Steve invited everyone to rejoin at Baker's Square for food and conversation after the evening clinic.

David James, Great Berea Train Show Chair, thanked everyone who volunteered. Approximate figures for the Show: Paid attendees at 2,691, Dealers and Not-for-Profit badges 400, making about 3,000 attendees, which is about 100 more than last year. Gross income at approximately \$35,894. Not all expenses are in yet, \$23,918 so far, giving an approximate net income for the Show of \$11,975. Polaris Vo-Tech Criminal Justice class will receive \$500 directly from the Train Show account for their security

work (has been a Division grant in the past for the same amount). Unclaimed door prizes will be part of the December Awards Banquet. The next two years have been booked at the Fairgrounds for the Show's normal time – the first full weekend in October. The Show's Facebook has been receiving a high number of hits.

Treasurer Greg Noeth reported assets of \$60,217, which is waiting on some invoices from Train Show.

Larry Madson, Clinic Chair, said that the evening's clinic would be by Jerry Benarsek on Mold Making. Gary Dunn will have next month's clinic on scenery backdrops. Larry asked for a show of hands on a tree-building make and take; receiving enough hands to say that a clinic would be done in the Spring.

Steve pointed out that Larry will not be at the November meeting and called for someone to set up the audio for the November meeting. No one volunteered.

Scott Benson, Module Group Chair, reported that they provided a layout for the Nickel Plate Historical and Technical Society with good feedback. Scott thanked everyone who provided support for the modules during the Train Show. Upcoming events including Training Day, the Great Lakes Science Center, and Lorain International Trees and Trains. There will be modular layouts at both the Science Center and Trees and Trains, with staffing required for each. Scott stated that he was working on the schedule and asked for volunteers for both events. The Modular Group will meet immediately after tonight's business meeting.

Joe Kurilec MMR asked for additional volunteers at the Great Lakes Science Center for display and interaction with the public on behalf of model railroading. [This is separate from the Modular staff requirements.] Models of Cleveland related models are welcome for display, although space is limited. Check in at the Science Center with Collen or Bernie; wear a Division shirt if possible. Steve said that he would provide the Science Center with a list of members' names to cross-check against volunteers.

Gary Schaefer, Training Day Chair, reminded everyone that this year's Training Day will be November 5, 11 am to 4 pm at the Black River Transportation Center in Lorain. Last year had 146 visitors with a good number of Division volunteers in support. A sign-up list is available tonight. Required slots this year are: Boy Scout Merit Badge, Make n Take, and Car Tuning. Module set-up time to be coordinated with Scott Benson.

Steve reported that only 62 Division members

volunteered during the Train Show, which is only about one-third of the Division membership. Normal meeting attendance is around 80. We would have had some staffing issues if Polaris hadn't helped at the gates. Raffle ticket sales were down due in part to a lack of sales people. Steve encouraged everyone to volunteer some time at the Great Lakes Science Center event as it should create more interest in model railroading in the general public.

display at the Medina County Fair this summer. A drawing was held for a Plymouth switch with DCC for those who attended the event. Joe Kurilec MMR won.

Bruce Brintnall MMR, Achievement Chair, announced that Joh Hemsath had earned his Structures certificate. With this certificate, John has met the requirements for Master Model Railroader, and will become MMR #602.

Dave Lawler, Contest Chair, said that the evening's contest is a Model in a Bottle. Last month's winners were announced and asked to describe the features of their models. Show and Tell exhibitors were also given a chance to describe their items. Next month's contest is single sheath boxcars (Dave brought in an example).

Ron Morgan, Layout Tour Chair, recommended visiting the upcoming Division 5 layout tours. Division 4's open house are during weekends of Nov 12 and 18, and will be in the Medina and Lorain areas.

Lee Sheffield gave details on the December 8 Awards Banquet at Carrie Cerino's in North Royalton. A signup sheet is available at tonight's meeting as well as the November meeting. Cost is \$15 for anyone 15 and over; children are free. Advanced reservations through Lee are required. Greg Noeth will be collecting at the November meeting in Lee's absence. Anyone making a reservation will be obligated to pay the associated cost whether or not they attend due to our required early payment to the facility. Santa's elf will be attending again, and there will be a new DJ. Looking forward to a good raffle. The menu was reviewed.

Jim Peters, Division 1, requested someone to give a clinic at the Division 1 meeting on October 22.

Mike Klein, Raffle Dude, thanked the Modular Group for their participation in the NKP convention, then reviewed items in the evening's raffle.

Steve presented Chuck Klein's report from the nominating committee. All elected officers eligible to run again are doing so (see list of elected officers elsewhere in this issue). Candidates for the two remaining offices are: Lee Sheffield for Superintendent and Ron Morgan for Assistant Superintendent. There are currently no contested positions. Any other person wishing to run for office is directed to the Division's website to review rules of procedure – then notify Chuck Klein. The election will be held in the Spring.

George Keller, as representative of the Mad River and

Nickel Plate Museum, updated us on the status of NKP Berkshire steam engine 757. They have raised approximately \$63,000 of the \$100,000 needed to transport the engine from The Pennsylvania Railroad Museum to Bellevue. Bearing work is now being done. The PRM moved the engine to a larger work area. T-Shirt sales supporting 757 at the Train Show brought in \$521 [shirts were in evidence at this evening's meeting – DMW]. George said that Trains Magazine donated \$10,000 towards restoration of the Mad River's dome car.

Steve said that the Board will meet on Tuesday November 7 to produce a budget for the upcoming year. Members will then vote on the budget at the November general meeting on Nov 11. Grants are discussed during the budget meeting. Members are welcome to attend the Board meeting to suggest support for any mission related projects. Such projects may also be suggested during the November general meeting.


Brian Haas said that someone outside the Division was looking for help learn how to set up his DCC system – contact Brian if interested.

## Is Europe's ghostliest train station about to rise again?

It was one of the world's most opulent railway stations, sitting imposingly on the French-Spanish border - but then it fell into disrepair.


Now, writes Chris Bockman, the building is showing new signs of life.

When they built the station at Canfranc, it was on a grand scale and with no expense spared. It had to be bold and modern - an architect's dream come true, built in iron and glass, complete with a hospital, restaurant and living quarters for customs officers from both France and Spain.

To give you an idea of its size - there are 365 windows, one for each day of the year; hundreds of doors; and the platforms are more than 200m long. The question is, how did such an extravagant high qu on station, mountainside in a village with a population of just 500 people, ever see the light of day?



At the turn of the 20th Century, the Spanish and French authorities had a grand project to open up their border through the Pyrenees, enabling more international trade and travel. lt was remarkably ambitious scheme, involving dozens of bridges and a series of tunnels drilled through the mountains.

At one point, work stalled as the French workers were sent off to fight in World War One. They were replaced by Spanish counterparts.

## THE RAFFLE DUDES





The station was built just to the Spanish side of the border, but one of the platforms was still considered French territory - like a kind of foreign embassy. French police and customs staff sent their children to a French-speaking school installed in the village.

But the day the station was opened in 1928 by the French President Gaston Doumergue and Spanish King Alfonso XIII, flaws quickly became apparent.

The rail gauges were different, so passengers still had to change trains. It made transporting goods as freight too slow. The Wall Street Crash of 1929 didn't help.

In the early 1930s, as few as 50 passengers a day were using Europe's second-biggest train station. And then things got worse. During the Spanish Civil War, Franco ordered the tunnels on the Spanish side sealed off, to prevent Republican opponents from smuggling weapons in.

When the international line re-opened during



## RIDE THE HIAWATHA TRAIL

On our trip to Seattle this summer for our middle daughter's wedding, we planned for a bike ride on the "Route of the Hiawatha" in the Bitterroot Mountains.

The ride is 15 miles (all downhill!!), passing through 10 tunnels and over 7 trestles. The first highlight (or maybe highdark) is the first tunnel - 1.66 miles long!! Yes, the rental bikes are equipped with headlights. Challenges in the tunnel included: 45 degree constant year-round temperature, cold water dripping on you and puddling along the route, and the gutter on each side to channel water out and catch haphazard bike wheels. A couple hundred yards in, I saw a small light in front of us. Oh, someone must be riding the other way (you can do the whole thing uphill). No, it was the other end of the tunnel, 1.5 miles away, dead straight-ahead. We survived the big tunnel without incident, ready for some hot chocolate at the end, which was not to be found.

We had a picture perfect day with spectacular views. There were historic, informational markers all along the route, describing the history of the rail route and Milwaukee Road. It's a 3+ hour ride at a leisurely pace, stopping for the views, the markers, snacks, and the occasional fall toilet.

A few details: you pick up your rental bikes at Lookout Pass ski resort, which has it's own exit off I-90 at the Montana/Idaho border. Mind the time zones!!! The ski resort is in one, the trail is in another! They give you a bike rack to use to get to the trail not far away. The trail begins at the east portal of the big tunnel. You have to pay a fee to use the trail, even if you're bringing your own bike. Pays for maintenance and "rangers" who ride the trail to offer assistance. At the end, they bus you back up the hill, but only to the west portal of the big tunnel. You finish your journey with another pass through the tunnel and a drive back to Lookout Pass to return the bikes. Everything was well-staffed and professional.

While we're both in decent shape, neither of us had ridden a bicycle in many years; no issues other than some minor soreness in unused muscles. It was a great addition to our trip west, and highly recommended!





## RAIL-FANS UP THE RIVER

In early July, Gary Schaefer joined my son Billy and me for a trip up the Cuyahoga River. This trip was to repeat my first trip, made last summer, by just Billy and me. We were amazed at all there was to see and wanted to share it with our photographer friend, Gary.

Our vessel is my yacht, named "Shrug". Shrug is a 15 foot Boston Whaler. Yep, she's a big one. Roomy enough for three guys, a cooler full of pop and snacks, and some photographic equipment. Normally, we'd leave from my yacht club, the teeny Bay Boat Club, right on the lake in Bay Village, but this day had a bit of a breeze and launching in waves is no fun. So we trailered to the Emerald Necklace Marina, in the Rocky River section of the Metroparks.

Once underway, our first rail-fan experience is traversing under the Norfolk Southern bridge across the Rocky River. This is a big old thing, due to be replaced, and because of the limited number of trains on the old NKP, we didn't expect to, and did not, see any trains above us.

We turned eastward out of the Rocky River toward Cleveland. A bit choppy, but nothing serious. We saw many landmarks from a side most people don't get to see. Lots of rich people's houses ··· Lakewood Park ··· the can't-be-missed towers of Lakewood's Gold Coast. Coming into Cleveland we saw the brand-new Cleveland Metroparks Edgewater Beach House. To the north as we approached the main Cleveland harbor entrance is the Five Mile Crib, the ship-sized water intake for one of Cleveland's water plants. For all you swimmers, it's really only three miles from the shore ··· so don't get discouraged.

We entered the Cleveland harbor, which runs behind a breakwall from nearly Edgewater Beach on the west to nearly Bratenahl on the east. Within this breakwall is the mouth of the Cuyahoga, the Rock Hall, the Browns stadium, Burke Lakefront Airport and several industrial facilities, including the Port of Cleveland.

We had an up-close view of front-end loaders loading railcars (see picture). This rail operation is interesting, a

complete circle, two tracks, around the unloading and storage site. Seems a slow way to load railcars, but it must make economic sense to somebody. Our guess was limestone, based on the color of the material … but we couldn't tell for sure.

We toured past the Port of Cleveland and over to the Inner Harbor where the William G. Mather steamship and now museum is permanently docked. Being men of the sea, we did not take a tour of the Mather, but every rail-fan interested in the Great Lakes ore boats owes himself a trip through this floating museum. The inner harbor area has other notable attractions, the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame being the most prominent.

We then proceeded into the river channel to begin our tour in earnest. First stop is to wait for NS1, the Norfolk Southern lift bridge over the Cuyahoga River ("CP Drawbridge"). With several other vessels having made

the call to the Bridge Tender, we just waited until the train traffic was such that the bridge could be lifted safely. On our tour last year, we were the only boat and so I radioed the Tender to ask if we could just pass under without a lift—and he agreed. This year, the water level of the lake makes the bridge too close to the river's level to safely clear under.

Once through, we took a turn to starboard into the first industrial channel. This channel is called "Old River" and is the original path of the Cuyahoga into the lake. I had never been up this channel, which passes under another lift bridge (for trucks, much more clearance). This channel threads its way westward through the various stone operations in the west bank Flats area. Signs of old wharf-side rails were everywhere. Sometimes old rail is used as rebar or other such construction materials—here, we saw track with ties still attached, dangling over the water!

A huge aggregate boat was docked in a slip off this channel, we figured he wouldn't even hear us if he backed up over us ··· propeller chopping us into a thousand pieces. The Great Lakes fleet boats are enormous. Her propeller probably weighs more than my boat, trailer, and tow vehicle combined!

Across from this boat are the facilities of Great Lakes Towing. Great Lakes is an owner and operator of a fleet of tugs, and their maintenance shop has morphed over the years into a shop for all manner of tugs, boats, and ships—they even build tugs there now! They are a true Cleveland success story. Division 4 member Lindsey Dew is director of operations there!

After exploring the Old River area, we then proceeded back to the main stem of the Cuyahoga for our trip up river. This area is right in downtown Cleveland, and if you haven't seen the "recreational" part of The Flats in recent years, you're in for a surprise. Massive new multi-use buildings feature restaurants on the lower level, office and retail, and apartments and condos upstairs. Some corporate HQs have located into the Flats, hotels, breweries, etc. More good news for Cleveland.

Past the downtown area, the Flats becomes immediately industrial. And crooked. We twisted and turned our

way up river past all manner of industry. A bit of recreation with the two big boathouse facilities for recreational rowing ("crew") boats. Then back to industry. It never lets up ... you're immersed in the sights, sounds, and smells of Cleveland's manufacturing. Doesn't smell like the old days ... but doesn't smell like the suburbs, either!

We ended our trip upward where we absolutely had to stop, right at the Arcelor-Mittal blast furnaces. If you're not sure what makes Cleveland industrial, take a look at this plant up close. You're looking into the Fires of Mordor, hearing the rumbles from within, the hiss of steam escaping. The sheer size of the plant, especially from the viewpoint of a 15' pleasure boat just feet from their property, is awesome—like the word "awesome" was meant to be used.

If you get the chance to go up-river, take it. Especially if you have an understanding of what it is you're looking at (as many of our members do); or if you have a guide. You really can't get so close to some of Cleveland's industrial facilities as you can by boat. And for rail-fans, I didn't even begin to describe all that you can see.

There is no scenery completed. The first deck bench work was built using "inverted L-girder" construction. A two track helix connects the lower and

upper decks. Control is NCE DCC. The lower level is staging and classification yard/engine facility. The helix should be completed and work begun on the second level by the time of the open house.



## Scott Benson – YET UNNAMED - DIVISION MILWAUKEE ROAD - HO

Scott's layout is in early phase of construction

The Yet-Unnamed Division is a proto-freelance layout, modeling the Milwaukee Road in Wisconsin in 1953, and is being built for operations.

It is a point-to-point layout, with staging at each end and a classification yard modeling Portage, Wisconsin. The maximum dimensions of the room are 30' x 30', but each corner is cut out by the roof-line, so it is cross-shaped.


The layout is double-deck, with the transition between decks occurring on one of two long peninsulas. This layout will use the NCE DCC system. Operating features



of the layout will include: passenger trains, through-freight with car exchanges at the classification yard, switching in several towns, a limestone quarry, and the Milwaukee MOW works in Tomah. Interchanges with the C&NW and Green Bay & Western are planned. Passengers traveling through the division will see scenery associated with the Dells, and will pass through



the only tunnel on the Milwaukee Road in Wisconsin at Tunnel City. Bench work is about 50% complete, east staging (Milwaukee) is in place and functioning, and



mainline track to the yard is functional. Scenery is about

## Larry Kuczynski SANTA FE - HO

0.5% completed.

This layout is loosely based and set in Arizona. The layout spans the years of 1980 thru 1996. Equipment is Santa Fe blue and yellow Warbonnets, kodachrome and Super Fleet units along with Burlington Northern and



Union Pacific diesels.

The railroad occupies three rooms in the basement. Room 1 is 24' x 14', room 2 is L-shaped and is 26' x 25' and room 3 is 18' x 10'. Construction is  $\frac{3}{4}$ " plywood frames with  $\frac{3}{4}$ " plywood sub-roadbed and  $\frac{1}{2}$ " homasote road bed.

The railroad is set-up to run staging yard to staging yard. Each staging yard is looped to turn trains for continuous running. A large 9 track yard occupies the center of the layout. Industries, sidings and scenery will be added in the near future. Railroad uses the NCE DCC wireless system.




## John Puch UNION VALLEY CENTRAL RR HO

The Union Valley Central (UVC) RR is a 27' x 14' double loop HO scale layout (in 2 rooms) based on small towns in Ohio and Pennsylvania.



This layout uses the NCE DCC system. Car Cards and Switch Lists are also used. UVC operations involve intricate switching in each of the six towns. It also



## features an operating coal mine, power plant with coal dumper, beer factory, interchange track and small yard. A variety of slide switches, hand throws and remote buttons are used by operators.

The scenery is approximately 90% completed.

An expansion of this layout was completed in 2016 to add a Wheeling interchange.

Modeling Eastern Ontario on Saturday evening, October 21st 1944. Innovative benchwork construction. Port areas are complete along with the adjacent river. Two new freight yards along with extensive new scenery and LED lighting now complete. Several examples of the LED streetlights featured in Dave's Div. 4, May, 2012 clinic are in place on the layout. DCC in and (hopefully) functioning well.

Sceniced areas of layout now have dimmable led lighting and led rope lighting behind deep valances that provide a more realistic effect. Fluorescent aisle way lighting can now be turned off during operation.





Today, the mayor of Canfranc is Fernando Sanchez, whose father was a customs officer at the station - he told me it became a spy hub for the Allies, but the Germans also used the rail line to transport gold they'd stolen from Europe.

After the war, the French lost interest in the line and allowed it to deteriorate. When a train derailed on the French side in 1970, that signalled the end and France abandoned the line.

The Spanish were furious, according to Fernando Sanchez - there was an international agreement to maintain the line and the French were accused of breaking it. Canfranc's

population, which had risen to 2,000 thanks to the station, dwindled to 500.

The grand building itself went to rot. The tracks rusted, the ceilings fell in with the harsh winter weather and vandalism did the rest.



But a few years ago the government local in Aragon decided to buy the place and restore it, claiming it was a major part of Spanish history. In the past four years 120,000 people have wearing hard visited, hats - ironically, far more than ever actually used the line when it was in service.

Nearly all the tourists are Spanish. They're fascinated the by station's size. and perhaps also a little proud of its symbolism the image it projected to the world. There are now even two trains a day between Saragossa and Canfranc.


only to refurbish the station as a hotel, but to build another one right next to it, and relaunch rail travel through the Pyrenees. The French regional government based in Bordeaux has agreed to reopen the line on its side too.

president, Alain lts Rousset, told me the route through the achingly beautiful Valley of Aspe will be branded the the "western trans-Pyrenean line" when it opens. He promised to find 200 million euros (£175m) to pay for it, and Brussels will offer matching funds.

Rousset says he has made a lot of enemies by pushing for this plan - pointing out that politicians in Paris had envisaged a motorway instead.

Graffiti scrawled on walls in the valley now read "Long live Canfranc". The line is back in favour.

If all goes to plan, the Titanic of the Pyrenees could be back in business within five years. I noticed that the massive wooden ticket counters at the station have already been restored.


