



The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A





There are three areas of our hobby that I enjoy the most; operations (and the friends it provides), structure/rolling stock construction and model/layout photography.

When I build structures, I really enjoy making the structure look as real and true to prototype as possible. I add interior and exterior lighting for most structures.

I have blue rope lighting installed on my layout. I purchased my rope lighting a number of years ago. It is a series of tiny light bulbs. New rope lighting utilizes LED's and would be the way to go if doing it today. While not typically utilized during operations (maybe a night OP session down the road guys?), it is really neat to run trains through scenes with the locomotive and caboose lights lit passing structures with both interior and exterior lights on. The blue rope lighting provides enough lighting to

"see" the trains and track while making the overall scene appear moon lit.

I am a decent modeler, not great. A few years ago I purchased Ngineering's Gooseneck Light Kit. These very 'to scale' kits make a great looking finished light fixture. HOWEVER, soldering 38 gauge magnet wire to TINY LED's, then fishing

the wire I can't even feel in my fingers through .012" diameter tubing is, to say the least, challenging. AND, my eyes were much better when I was doing this than they are now.

Shortly after starting my current East Broad Top roundhouse project, I came across a Chinese Ebay vendor selling OO/HO LED light fixtures The price was very reasonable at \$5 for a package of 5. I ordered them. When they arrived I was very happily surprised at their quality as well as scale size. And they even supplied the resistors you need!



The EBT roundhouse lights were installed in the days of "knob & tube" wiring with the lamp shade suspended by the two wires feeding it. I purchased the LED light that similarly had just the two wires coming out of the shade. With them installed I think the effect came out pretty well.



I have since found this same company makes a number of different styles, all commonly used on the structures we model.











The only downside in this age of instant gratification and common 2-day shipping is delivery is by standard postal

service. It takes several weeks for the package to arrive all the way from China, so plan ahead!

I will be bringing some to the April meeting so you can see them for yourselves.


Our application to the Kansas City National Train Show has been officially accepted! Larry Madson and I are working

#### **Module Spotlight**

Module Spotlight: Amtrak

**Inspiration:** At the time we built this, our first module, Billy was really into Amtrak, something he still follows to this day, though his Amtrak interest has shifted from model trains to rail-fanning, amateur incident investigation, and critique of operations.

**Description:** Amtrak is a single standard module, 2' x 4', built with a solid top. The station itself is a standard Cornerstone kit, with only a few enhancements: we added a bit of roof equipment such as soil stacks, HVAC, etc, and we divided the interior space.

The standard interior for this kit is a large open room with no interior supports or details at all. We added a central block of rooms, leaving a hallway around the inside perimeter of the building. The central block is literally a block, of wood, which we decorated with a scene cobbled together from various photos on the web of things like "doors" and "ticket windows" and "Amtrak posters". We resized, dragged, and dropped these items into a new graphics file, which we then printed as a photo at a one- hour photo shop. We cut the photo to fit

the block and, voilà, we've got an interior that's painted, decorated, and interesting. We did not yet continue this project to the interior perimeter walls, and we've had a bit of trouble with our photo paper not sticking to the wood block (which may necessitate printing again, and attaching with good boat caulking). (Hint - try 3M Super 77 spray adhesive - Editor)

We lit the interior with several blue-white LED's shooting up from the middle of the wood block, reflecting off aluminum foil glued to the underside of the roof. Billy is not fond of the color of the lights, but I think their harshness mimics the fluorescent interiors of commercial buildings of the era. These lights and the outside street lights get a lot of comments from visitors. We hope to ramp this up a bit in our spring modifications. One problem we know of is the LEDs are visible from outside the building (see pic).

We erected the Station building on a graded surface elevated above the surrounding flatlands. The elevation is courtesy of one of my mother's old kitchen cabinet drawer fronts cut to size with a chamfered edge all around. Walthers provided the station platform material. Our first experiment with stairs and handrails leads down to the parking lot.



One thing I thought came out well was the curbs on the parking lot. These are Plastruct of appropriate size, glued into place (we used pushpins instead of re-bar to anchor our "forms"). We then "poured" a blacktop parking lot (cheap paint from the hardware store), striped it with a yellow paint-marker (the kind with actual paint), and used a different black paint (good paint from a hobby shop) to make "oil stains" on some of the parking spots. One of the things that is most realistic in our parking lot is we paid attention to the vintage of the automobiles and we park them the way real people park them ... badly. Sometimes we feign a car-tree collision. One of our biggest failures on the parking lot is that it is completely, perfectly level (unlike the real world); completely, perfectly in good shape (unlike our local world); and in a couple places the grain of the underlying plywood shows through. Ick. I would like to add steel manhole and drain covers, a bit of "terrain", and a pothole or two, but that's far down the priority list.

Our street lights are from Atlas. These are really neat units, keeping the wiring and light below the table, the post is a hollow tube with a light pipe atop. They remove easily for transport (they are delicate). If you should ever use these, keep each light post stored in a separate soft wrapper of some sort. The paint on top of the light (which is molded into the shape of a "fixture" at the end of the light pipe) chips off pretty easily, allowing light to shoot straight up. Ick. Treat yours with kid gloves ... we'll be repainting ours.

Finally, the track on this module is 100% standard, 100-100-83 Atlas, straight through, no switching, nothing. A bit boring, and we have to rely on other modules to get to the local (to disembark passengers!). But it was our first and we wanted to keep it simple. And overall, this is what we did ... a nice, clean, simple layout, if a bit sterile. We've learned a lot and hope to step up our game on this and our new module set, an Intermodal Yard.



Editor's note: In the first part of this article the author talked about how he began his journey to becoming an MMR and specifically about gaining his Association Volunteer and Master Builder Cars certificates. In this section he discusses the paperwork you'll need and several additional certificates.

#### **Paperwork**

When your work is to be judged, you have to fill out paper work. The Judges' Score Sheet is one page long. I've seen them filled in with no addendum, in pencil, and the model earned a merit award. Your paper work is not being judged. It's just there to aid the judges who don't need much help. As a contest judge, I can assure you that if you attach a sheaf of explanatory pages to your judges' score sheet, the judges may thumb through them, but they won't read them. "Don't make it any harder than it has to be!"

So how can you make it easier on yourself? Keep notes on every model you build whether it is to be judged or not. Keep notes on every project on the layout; track laying, wiring, power, scenery, etc. I used to hand write these and kept them in a 3-ring binder. Now I have a computer at my bench and keep all these notes as files. For example: Boxcar - steel, Boxcar - single sheathed, Boxcar -double sheathed, tank cars, structures off line, structures on line, etc. Here's the sort of information I record; kit manufacturer, commercial parts added by me, decals, wheel sets and trucks, paint colors and brand, what did I scratch build? Weathering techniques; oils, powders, spray, etc., article I followed, prototype information I used. I also often take photos of the model in process. Every photo I took to use toward my MMR was taken by a simple digital pocket camera with no adjustments for f-stops or focus. When it comes time to fill in the judges' score sheet, you've got all the data you need. You won't forget anything important. It will take you no time at all. You can do it in pencil.

#### Chief Dispatcher, Model Railroad Engineer Electrical, Model Railroad Engineer Civil

Read all the requirements for each. If you can incorporate the requirements and the electives you get to choose into your own layout design, you will be hours and hours ahead of where I was. Remember, one track diagram will work for each of these certificates.

When Harold Taylor invited me to my first op session, it was a game changer for me. Up to that point I thought I would be lone wolf. I went home and rethought the concept of my layout. I figured out how I could host two guest operators. I made a lot of new friends. Friends who would help me toward my MMR. I began to operate on more layouts and pretty soon the hours added up to the 50 required. But the paper work for the Dispatcher stumped me. I read the advice article, but still did not understand. Finally I attended a clinic at a regional given by Bob Weinheimer, MMR on developing an operating system and it all fell into place. When I got home, I was able to develop a timetable, train chart, and system of operation in very short order.



Electricity has always scared me. My palms sweat when I have to change a light bulb. I am so grateful for LEDs. So when I decided to tackle the Electrical certificate it was with considerable trepidation. However, as I reread



had already accomplished nearly everything I had to do! I had to make diagrams of the wiring, but you can just hand copy what you'll find on line. And the paperwork? Three fill-in-the-blanks pages, 3 pages of my diagrams, and 3 pages of photos and descriptions of what I had done. In my case that was wiring a turnout,, a crossover, a three-way turnout, an animated display, a DCC system, and a simple decoder installation in a locomotive (no lights, no sound). What was I afraid of?

Civil. Same story. When I checked the requirements, I found that I had already completed most of them while building the layout. What I hadn't done was hand lay turnouts. As a kid I had read about it in Model Railroader. Seemed daunting, scary, and, up until now, completely unnecessary. And then a miracle occurred. It was like when my college dropped the foreign language requirement, and I could get my degree. The new miracle was Fast Tracks system of turnout jigs. And the Division will loan them to you! And you can also buy all the track and ties too. And you can follow the how-to videos on line while you're building! The one problem was that I had already laid all the track on my layout. So I built a stand-alone display that incorporated all the requirements, and I felt very pleased with myself. Paperwork: 4 pages of fill-in-the-blanks, and seven pages I created of photos and captions of the completed requirements. If I had made the photos smaller it would have taken fewer pages, but when you're working on a computer, it's not a big deal. While the local judges can easily see what you've done, you also have to show it to the national chair. So you need the photos. The NMRA forms are a piece of cake. Your name, number, etc., and a bunch of check marks in the boxes for what you did. Passing siding: check. Spur: check. Wye: check. Is this hard?



# PROTOTYPE RAILROAD IMAGES, PART 2

My Railcrew Express job took me to Buffalo, New York for this interesting item.

At the CSX Frontier yards I found a new use for a containers. The yards use this as a storage place for tools and other supplies.



It would be an interesting AND easy addition to any layout!



Here is the right side view of the container.

While at Collinwood yards in Cleveland, Ohio I found this Sperry Rail Service truck. This truck does tests on the rails as it drives on the track.

Ultrasonic data is gathered and used by Sperry technicians. If there are problems, technicians use a "walking stick" for manual verification to confirm defects.

Some containers were used to ship mail. The LCL Corporation exclusively handled bulk mail. (Thanks to Tony Koester and John Slater for added info.)

The NYC, Pennsy and other railroads used these bulk mail containers. This type of container was used for mail only!



Another use for containers was the shipment of dolomite. Dolomite is a natural limestone used in agriculture. Bill Cramer added dolomite is also used to help preserve the lining of blast furnaces.

Ron Spiga added needed research for this article. At the end of this article are more images of a rail grinding train.



# THE BYLINE...

In the next few Bylines I'll be talking about participation in Operating (OP) sessions and work sessions. About twelve to fifteen years ago I met a gentleman named Dave Bitte. Dave lived in Rittman, Ohio at that time. He invited me over to his house for an OP session. This was one of the first OP sessions where we ran a variety trains over the layout. By variety, we ran locals, run-throughs, yard-transfers and a few trains that were made up on-line.

Dave modeled eastern Ohio and West Virginia coal country. Interestingly, his layout had full scenery. He accomplished this by having a well-done backdrop that blended well with the mountains and trees. He didn't go to a lot of detail and I seldom noticed because the trains ran well and the concept of the layout was very good.

At one OP session I was running a coal drag and received a "stop order" at the bridge just before the yard lead. While waiting for my clearance, I started examining the bridge in front of me. Now, I had seen this bridge many times and never noticed that it was really part of the benchwork. Our Editor was nearby and I pointed out the bridge and that it was part of the benchwork. He immediately responded, "oh that's a Bitte Bridge."

When I was building my benchwork, I had an area that would require a 27-inch bridge. I didn't want to take the time to build bridge kits and fit them into this area; plus, the bridge needed to be very strong as it is by my electrical box. I remembered Dave's bridge. The pictures that follow are my "Bitte Bridge" with a brief narrative on how it was built.

I started with ¾ inch plywood. Cut the piece to the desired length and width. Next, a poplar 1x2 was screwed to the bottom of the plywood to keep it flat. Then I cut a 27-inch indentation on each side of the plywood for a Plastruct I-Beam, glued the plastic I-beam to the plywood with liquid nails and capped the seams in the I-beam with channel stock. Next, I glued some Atlas bridge girders to the top of the Plastruct I-beam. I used the bridge girders that Atlas sells in a 4 pack and the sides from a Warren Truss bridge to add interest.


When everything was dry, it was given two coats of Krylon flat black.

The track is a Micro Engineering Bridge Flex-Trak I found at our show for \$4; and some Campbell's wood bridge guard timbers, with Tichy bolt sets for a touch of detail. Code 70 guardrails finished off the look.

This area of the layout will continue to make the Byline from time to time.

At the end of last year, Dave and his wife moved to

North Carolina. He is missed, but many of us remember the great OP sessions he hosted and the fun we had running his layout.
