The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A



Most (maybe not all but **DEFINITELY ME**) model railroaders own a variety of tools. I often amaze even myself that after 60 years in this hobby I read an article or review a newly received tool catalog and find an item I do not own but surely must.

I also enjoy the "techie" side of our hobby with the new mechanical and electrical/electronic items that are nearly continuously being introduced to us.


Several of our hobby publications have had recent articles where the author uses laser cutting and/or 3D printing to generate pieces of his model. I work part-time at a nearby vocational school. I received our Adult Education flyer in September. While flipping the pages, I saw an class on MAKING AND USING A 3D PRINTER. Further reading indicated the participants would assemble a 3D printer kit and then learn some of the things you need to know to make use of it. The next day I walked down to the Adult Eduction area (I work in the high school section) and signed up. Further good news, as an employee I only had to pay the course materials with zero tuition. Cool!

The particular printer the class provides is an Anet A6 unit. These can be purchased on Amazon and eBay for as little as \$150. Like any "cheap vs other options" tool, it bet our printers assembled. Leveling the bed and zeroing in the Z-axis motor turned out to be the two most critical advantage (other than myself) so I aspects in the initial setup.

You can use different software to design your 3D parts. For me, that will be the next step and a likely editorial

subject. For now, I went on-line to THINGIVERSE.COM and searched ANET A6. The search results produced a ton of items to print that can be used to improve the A6. downloaded several and started my printing adventure.



The photo shows me printing a new fan housing that with the addition of some small rare earth magnets, will allow quick and easy access to the extruder head. I also printed the green button on the top of the extruder head. It helps protect your finger when you have to press on a spring loaded screw release the filament.

The quality of the print is as good as I hoped. I am thinking I will actually be able to print HO scale windows, doors and other details in an acceptable quality. Time will tell!

I have a feeling a "cheap vs other options" laser cutter is not too distant in my future. Hmmmm. 🚂

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

NMRA MCR Division 4 General Meeting Minutes for Friday November 9, 2018

Church of the Redeemer, Westlake Ohio

The meeting was called to order by Superintendent Lee Sheffield at 7:30 pm. Lee called for any corrections to the October meeting Minutes as they appeared in the latest *Flatwheel*. Receiving no reply, Lee stated that the Minutes were accepted as printed. Lee then asked all military veterans to stand for recognition.

Treasurer Greg Noeth gave a review of the finances of the Division.

Membership Chair George Keller asked for visitors and new members to stand and identify themselves.

Clinic Chair Larry Madson said that the evening's clinician would be guest Mike Kole speaking on The Valley Railway. No clinic in December since that meeting is the Awards Banquet. The January clinician will be Bram Bailey.

Contest Chair Dave Lawler said the evening's contest is for single domed tank cars. Winners of the October contest for "sheds in poor repair" were asked to speak about their entries. No contest next month. January's contest will be for lightweight/streamlined passenger cars.

The Flatwheel deadline is November 26, 2018.

Joe Filipiak displayed recent Walthers kits representing the brick industry, stating that he had supplied Walthers with background information and a gentle "push" to fill that overlooked railroad industry.

Module Committee Chair Scott Benson spoke on locating resources for T-Trak. Scott said the module setup at the Berea Library had been well received and that everyone (operators and visitors) seemed to have a good time at the Training Day display. Scott said the

group will have a large layout operating during the annual Trees and Trains in Lorain and gave an invitation to those not usually involved with the modules to come out and run trains during the event (Friday/Saturday/Sunday November 25 through December 31, with Friday hours being 5-9 and Saturday/Sunday hours being 3-7). For 2019, the module group will participate in the World's Greatest Hobby in Novi, Michigan in February and will be part of the Cuyahoga County Fair in Summer 2019. Displays are also scheduled for the Strongsville and Avon Lake libraries as well as the Independence Train Show.

Training Day Chair Gary Schaefer reported that 31 volunteers hosted 118 visitors for Training Day on Sunday November 4 at the Black River Center in Lorain. Gary said that, while not a record attendance, we seemed to draw a new group of people interested in model railroading, with many remaining over an hour.

Layout Tour Chair Ron Morgan briefed everyone on the upcoming layout open houses. Members should have received specific information via email on dates and locations. Ron also reminded everyone that Cuyahoga Valley & West Shore Model Railroad Club would be having their open house during the first two weekends in December.

Lee Sheffield talked about the Awards Banquet to be held on our regular meeting night of Friday, December 14 at Carrie Cerino's. Doors open at 6 pm with dinner served at 7 pm. Santa's elf is scheduled to make an appearance. See Greg Noeth to make your reservation. The event is \$15 for each adult, with children under 15 free.

George Keller reminded everything that the Mad River & NKP Museum would be running their Santa Train during the holiday season.



Items discussed included numbers related to the Great Berea Train Show and grants to be given by the Division to various organizations. A starting list of possible grant organizations had been identified during the November 6 Board Meeting and was presented to the membership for their discussion. A motion was made by Larry Kowicki that the identified organizations each receive an

equal portion of the available grant funds. The motion was seconded by Jim Moore. Following discussion, the motion passed unanimously. Train Show Chair David James reported that renting an additional building at the Fairgrounds is being considered. The building is more enclosed than the other fairgrounds buildings and could draw (or retain) exhibitors requiring that environment. A request was made to consider having someone – possibly Taylor Rental- take down the tables and chairs at the end of the Train Show, which will be investigated by the Train Show committee. John Hemsath MMR made a motion to accept the budget, with Bram Bailey seconding. The budget was accepted by the membership unanimously.

Meeting adjourned at 8:59 pm.



Superintendent Lee Sheffield called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. All members in attendance received a general budget worksheet displaying budgeted and actual expenditures for the current year as well as proposed budgets for 2019. An alternate idea was presented to identify an outstanding modeler for the calendar year, with an award to be given during the year end Awards Banquet. Mr. Lawler said he would continue working on the project and

keep the board informed.

Grants were discussed. Lee stated that we were interested in organizations with specific requests for their upcoming projects. Five organizations were identified as potentially being worthy of consideration. Lee stated that the Division membership would be asked for any other organizations to be considered during the upcoming general meeting. A discussion was held on possible limits for any one group to receive. A traditional limit was cited but we have no specific rules concerning the amount. It was decided that amounts would be determined during the general meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:29 pm.



The practice of assigning seats on long-distance trains is common in Europe and Asia, but Amtrak has always had a first-come first-served policy. That practice has at times resulted in passengers not being able to find seats during holiday and other peak seasons.




Note: I have had a couple of members ask about directions to the banquet, so I hope these fill the need:





While not a hobby shop this place has a lot of plastic material that modelers can use.




House of Plastic is NOT a hobby shop but does offer a ton of plastic items and tools that model railroaders can use. The staff is SUPER friendly and VERY helpful.

As you enter House of Plastic you'll see many tools for working with plastics. Polishing supplies, glues and a nice selection of small plastic shapes and some very useful plastic hinges in several sizes.


When viewing these parts you may come up with some new uses!





At the rear of the store I found tubes, rods and square shaped plastic. Colors are clear or black. They do not sell items such as Evergreen or Plastruct shapes. The square shaped plastic would make great

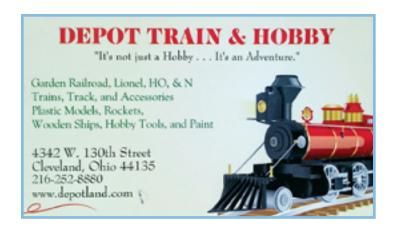




