





The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A





It is December 10<sup>th</sup> as I write this editorial (hint to column writers, you, too, can write and submit your columns well before the 26th!). This is my 20th issue as your editor. I realize I have repeated a couple editorial themes. You have my apologies. It can be difficult to come up with new ideas on an ongoing monthly basis.



Like Bob Walker, author of *Railroad Model Craftsman's* Scratchbuilder's Corner, I am a tool junkie. And Amazon's 1-Click function continuously feeds my habit. Starting with this editorial I am going to discuss in a series of editorials my tools, covering the spectrum from highest value to "why did I buy this?" but not necessarily in that order.

One of my many bad attributes when it comes to our hobby is a lack of patience. It tends to push my work towards the lower end of the quality scale. At \$349, one of the more expensive tools I own, my MicroLux® Mini Tilt Arbor Table Saw is one tool I use on nearly every project I do. It helps in both speed, i.e., lack of patience,

and quality of work accomplished. Both attributes I badly need supported.

The saw has more than ample power to cut most wood including hardwoods. I just cut some 1/2" MDF with ease. The saw has optional blades that can be purchased and used to cut ferrous and non-ferrous metals. I have those optional blades in my tool box but have not used them as it is a bit of a job to change blades and I have not had a project large enough to warrant their use. Again, that lack of patience pops up. It also has enough power to cut skin (and probably bone, although I did not go quite that deep!). Only three stitches, no big deal.

The miter and fence that come with the saw provide the accuracy we modelers need.

I have over time purchased several accessories that truthfully I have rarely or never used. The Dado Cutting System, Taper Jig and 2 inch high x 10 inch long extruded aluminum rip fence are three such accessories. They are all well made and your project needs may make use of them where mine have not.

I did purchase and have often used a couple items. The 40 Tooth Carbide Tip Saw Blade is great for heavier materials and with 40 teeth still makes a smooth cut. Similarly, I purchase and use as my standard blade the 80 Tooth Saw Blade. The gap alongside the blade is too large when working with small wood or plastic using the plate that comes with the saw . Using the plastic Blank Blade Plates in place of the stock aluminum plate solves this issue.

Speaking of plastic, I forgot to mention the saw has variable speed allowing you to slow it down when cutting plastic.

**EDITOR** 

An accessory I purchased, used often, but cannot recommend is the Sliding Table. Conceptually it is a great idea. However, the wood guide rails glued to the bottom are much too loose in the miter slots. The precision we need in our hobby necessitates much tighter tolerances.



Tool value for me is defined as cost times usage. This tool is one of the highest valued tools in my collection and I highly recommend it.

As always, Model Railroading is Fun !!! 🌉





Union Pacific Railroad will be part of this week's funeral procession for President George H.W. Bush, who died Nov. 30 at the age of 94.

Following funeral and memorial services in Washington, D.C., and Houston, Bush will be transported by the funeral train from Spring to College Station, Texas, on Thursday.

The funeral train will leave UP's Westfield Auto Facility at 1 p.m. Thursday and should arrive at College Station by 3:25 p.m., UP officials said in a press release.

College Station is the location of the George H.W. Bush Presidential Library, where Bush will be laid to rest.

The funeral train will include UP No. 4141 George Bush Locomotive, which was unveiled Oct. 18, 2005, during a ceremony near the library and museum on the Texas A&M University campus.

The custom-painted unit incorporates the colors of the Air Force One used during Bush's years as president, from 1989 to 1992. Bush was the nation's 41st president, hence the locomotive bears the number 4141.

The SD70ACe locomotive measures 15 feet 11 inches tall and weighs 420,000 pounds with a full tank of diesel fuel, according to UP's website.





Electrics at Copper Cliff are covered in detail. Many of the smaller communities between them are covered with a single shot. This book focuses on the Canadian National, Ontario Northland, VIA Rail, Inco, Algoma Central/Wisconsin Central and Canadian Pacific.

Vintage first generation diesel power is featured with a lot of emphasis on MLW FPA4, RS18 and RS23 as well as GMD, FP7, FP9, GP9, and SW1200RS units. In addition there is a lot of early second generation content that includes, MLW C424, M630 and M636 as well as GMD SD40, SD40-2, GP40-2LW & F40PH units. In addition to that, there is coverage on Inco's electrics, some of which date back to the 1920's and 30's.





# GOOGLE PHOTOS - A GREAT HOBBY TOOL

I have written a number of times that photography is a strong subset of my model railroading hobby. I have also written how the cameras in our smart-phones have matured into tools that allow for taking very good photographs. The fact that our phones are always with us is a major benefit in supporting their use in documenting our hobby.

My phone is always in my pocket and ready to take photos. So I take a LOT of photos, hobby and otherwise. As I write this, 6/6/2018, I have 35,653 photos stored in Google Photos! I know, that is a BUNCH of photos. This includes all the digital photos I have taken with digital cameras and phones, going back to 2002 and back in the day my company provided Canon G2 (a whopping 4 MP!). It also includes photos I download from the web while researching railroad subjects.

I would be devastated if I lost any or all these photos.

So how do we protect/store a large collection of digital photographs?

Google Photos has been my answer to that question for a number of years.

#### PHOTO STORAGE

Google Photos provides *FREE*, *UNLIMITED* PHOTO STORAGE on photos up to 16MP. To put that size "limit" in perspective, my current smart-phone is the latest, greatest Samsung Galaxy Note 8 (was latest, greatest when I wrote this in June). The photos it takes are 12.2MP, so Google Photos will store them for free without any compression required. This size "limit" only becomes a factor if you own a DSLR camera. If you do, you can still take advantage of Google Photos free storage but only up to a total of 15 GB's. If that storage limitation should become an issue, they have additional storage available for reasonable costs.

To take advantage of Google Photos, you need a Google account. These are free and easy to set up. Once you have your account, you download the Google Photos app to your phone, tablet, laptop, etc.

With your account active, I recommend you then go to SETTINGS on each device where you plan to use it and setup how you want Google Photos to interact with the device. I have mine setup to automatically upload any new photos I may add with my device. You point it to the location(s) on the device where you store your photos. On my phone, I set it such that it will only upload when I am using WiFi so I don't impact my plan's

data limit.

With your account in place and your many photos now stored on-line, you now will see the other great tools Google Photos makes available.

#### **EDITOR**

Google Photos has a built in EDITOR. Select the photo you wish to edit, then click on the edit symbol " $\frac{1}{3-\frac{1}{\mu}}$ " in the upper right corner to edit the photo in EDITOR. You will first see there are currently 14 filters. Clicking on any one filter will apply the filter to your photo. If you like what you see, click DONE and Google Photos saves your photo with the adjustments made by the filter. The one filter I use quite often is AUTO. It makes subtle adjustments that I personally feel improve most of my photos.

However, you are not limited by individual filter's settings. After selecting a filter, you can make further adjustments. At the top of the filter selection tab, click on the symbol BASIC ADJUSTMENTS. It will show three main factors and their current settings based on the filter being applied. You can slide the individual sliders to further adjust LIGHT, COLOR and POP. But don't stop there. Each of those have more adjustment hidden under them. Access these by clicking on the " \forall " symbol. One neat adjustment you can make to many of your prototype photos is to click on the COLOR adjustment. The last adjustment at the bottom is DEEP BLUE. By sliding this to the right, you can darken the sky to provide a gorgeous color to frame the object of your photo.

While still on the EDIT tab, at the top right you will find a symbol for CROP & ROTATE. I also use this feature quite often to quickly and easily crop the photos that I plan to share or publish. The ROTATE function is very handy as well. You can use it to turn your photo by 90 degree increments to get it in the correct position versus the upside down, or side-wise position you originally photographed it. Many edit programs have this feature. But Google Photos also provides a slider to ROTATE your photo a small amount in either direction. This allows you to align the photo so that the horizon is actually level in the photo. I find this is particularly handy with model photos. When you finish your adjustments, you click DONE and your photo is now stored, ready to share and amaze your friends and family!

Oh, one more thing about editing, while not showing it

any longer in your account, Google maintains the original photo, so even long after making and saving adjustments, you can get back to the original.

#### **ASSISTANT**

Google Photos has too many features for me to elucidate in this one article. However, there is one I do want to mention. Google Photos ASSISTANT can be used to easily generate such things as a COLLAGE, MOVIE, ANIMATION, PHOTO BOOK, SHARED ALBUM or ALBUM.

Google Photos will also automatically look at your photos and generates these based on Al (artificial intelligence) (I think)?). You then have the choice to discard, further modify or save them.

This function will generate a photo applying filters and effects. They are sometimes quite good. The cover photo of this issue was a shot I took on Joe Filiiak's layout while operating last May. The original photo was nice but not particularly memorable. But when I saw the suggested edits, I thought, WOW, and very quickly copied/pasted it to use as this month's cover photo. Purist will say I did not do the work so I should not get the credit. I say, OK, I will share the credit with Google. Thanks Google. Your Raffle Bucks are in the mail.

#### **PHOTO ORGANIZATION**

One last thing I want to talk about is how I manage 35,000+ photos. Google Photos defaults storage of your photos by the date digitally encoded with the file, most recent at the top. I don't remember what I had for supper last night, so how am I to find that photo I took a few years ago of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ (fill in the blank)? Google Photos provides several tools to help you. The search function is scarily amazing. Click on the magnifying glass icon at the top of your page and many options appear. Using AI, it can find faces. When I click on my wife's face, all the photos with her lovely countenance within the 35,000 photos magically appear. WOW! Type in BRIDGE, and all photos with a bridge in them appear.

#### **ALBUMS**

Another photo management tool I take heavy advantage of is ALBUMS. I currently have 120 albums. Shortly after taking a group of photos, say a visit to a railroad museum, I go through them, deleting any obviously bad shots. I also use the edit tool to

improve the better shots, most often simply using the suggested AUTO filter with no other adjustments. I then select all the photos taken at the museum and using the CREATE icon, I create a new album with a name that will easily allow me to find the photos a few years from now when I want to remember my visit, or use one of the photos in an upcoming issue of *The Flatwheel*.

I use albums to document my model railroad projects. While I am building a structure I will take many photos, adding them to an album I have generated for this purpose. I take photos of any special tools or materials I may use during the project. I take photos of the paints I use. All these will help me recall in the future how I did certain aspects of the project.

I also use albums to help me in my prototype research. I am currently building my East Broad Top v3.2 layout. I will eventually need to populate it with the many iconic EBT structures and features, motive power and rolling stock. I have individual albums of many of the structures I will need to construct. So while my construction of Pogue Bridge is a ways off, I already have 71 photos that will help me build a good

representation of the original.

I have albums of the numerous layouts I have visited or had the privilege to operate. I use the owner's name and his railroad as the album's name, making it easy to find all the pictures I have of JIM MOORE's LAKE ERIE & COLD CREEK RR. With 120 albums and counting, I would still need to scroll through the album listing to find Jim's. But using the search function, I start typing J...I and up pops two choices...BENCH GRINDER JIG or JIM MOORE'S LAKE ERIE & COLD CREEK RR. Easy and fast.

#### **SHARING**

The last feature I want to mention is SHARING. You can select a photo, or bunch of photos or an album. Click on the SHARE icon and send a link via email or text message to anyone.

Whether you take photos for your hobby, family events, vacations...etc. Google Photos is a free and great tool to use with them.






