The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A





This month's "tool" themed editorial is on another very inexpensive but high value tool in my workshop...clamps. Clamps come in all shapes and sizes and most, not all, are inexpensive.



The ubiquitous two-piece sprung wooden clothes pin makes a great clamp. And, they come in numerous sizes. Personally, I use two of the smaller sizes, the one inch and the 1 3/8" lengths. The more traditional size used by our

moms on clothes lines in the pre-clothes dryer age are 2 3/4" long. They can also be useful. Don't forget you can cut, file and otherwise modify one of both jaws when a special shape will aid your clamping needs.



The second most used clamp in my workshop is the plastic spring loaded type with swiveling jaws. Again, they come in numerous sizes. I have 1", 2" and 3". While not easily modified like the wood

clamps, the swivel jaws are beneficial in applying the clamping force on various surfaces.

Also extremely useful are quick grip clamps. Though not inexpensive, the ones I use most often are approximately 6" long. I keep six of this size

on my hobby bench. I have more of the larger sizes in my regular shop. These, while infrequently used for modeling, have been very beneficial in my layout building efforts.



While technically not a "clamp", I often use the pictured magnetic gluing jig when assembling structures and rolling stock. "Clamping" the pieces between the bottom and sides with the

magnets ensures a square connection every time. \$25.95 is not inexpensive, but I consider this one of my most valuable tools given the quality it provides to my modeling and the frequency of use.



Coffman corner clamps are well designed tools made for a specific use. Since their initial introduction to the hobby, they have added other sizes and configurations. Honestly, I have a set but I seldom use them. Like many tools, your experience and personal preferences will impact your choices.

Let me know what tools you frequently use, or "wasted" your money on. A photo and a few words are more than sufficient to share your knowledge with the membership

# GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

# NMRA MCR Division 4 General Meeting Minutes for Friday, April 12, 2019

## Church of the Redeemer, Westlake Ohio

Superintendent Lee Sheffield opened the meeting at 7:30 pm. welcoming everyone attending. As the March meeting was the Biennial Auction with no business meeting, there were no minutes to approve.

Treasurer Greg Noeth reported the current cash balance. Greg then reported we had 14 members who sold items at the auction and 31 members who bought items for a total of \$1,646 in transactions. This year's auction was physically setup different than years past. Lee asked how the members liked it. The response was positive so Lee indicated the arrangement will be used going forward.

Membership Chair George Keller had one visitor respond to his call. The visitor requested help in how to join the organization with George responding he would handle getting the future new member a Rail Pass. Some Medina County 4H were present including a new NMRA member. Also, new member Tom David was in attendance. Tom joined at the recent Div. 5 Lakeland show. Tom models N gauge and is interested in learning about operations. George reported there are 5 new members on the latest membership report received from National. George concluded by thanking those who helped at the membership table in Kirkland.

Clinic Chair Larry Madson informed us the evening's clinic would be presented by Jim Moore on JMRI's DeCoder Pro software. Next month Gary Sole will present a slide show on The Biggest Events in U.S. Railroad History Since 1850. This clinic will cover railroad history starting with the development of Chicago as a rail hub in 1850, to the current railroad landscape of 2019. Along the way, the timeline will cover the four Transcontinental railroads, the financial panic of 1893 (that totally changed the railroad maps of America), development of US Steel, the USRA Joint line, Great Depression, Mergers and many more current

events. Along the way are a number of modeling ideas. Sounds great! – Editor The June clinic will be on 3D Printing for Model Railroading by Bruce Bowie. Bruce will present a clinic on what he has learned during the past six months of owning an inexpensive 3D printer. The goals of this clinic include: Show the possibilities of 3D printing for our hobby use, Show the costs involved, Show how he approaches 3D design and printing but NOT intended as a step-by-step "how to". Bruce will have his printer with him and use it to print a sample item for those who have never seen how they function. Member Spain James will be presenting the September clinic on Ohio's narrow gauge railroads.

Module Chair Scott Benson said the Module Group has wrapped up a very busy winter/spring season. The group is preparing for a new venue, the Cuyahoga County Fair to be held this year August 6-11. Scott also mentioned to new member Tom David he might consider the T-Trak activity for his N scale modeling.

AP Chair Bruce Brintnall stated there were no new AP activities to report.

Contest Chair Dave Lawler noted as previously reported he is stepping down after the June meeting. Dave was happy to report Joe Filipiak will be assuming the role of this important and fun activity. Joe then added Don Glass will be taking on Joe's current even more important and fun role as Meeting Refreshments Chair. Dave reported the contest tonight is Heavy Duty Construction Equipment with an excellent selection of February contest (NO MARCH models present. CONTEST DUE TO BIENNIAL AUCTION), DIESEL YARD SWITCHERS, winners; Model 1st place by Brandon Wehe, second place John Hemsath's Walthers EMD SW1 painted as the prototype, 3rd place Gary Shaefer's Athearn SpectrumSW1000, Jeff Lauren's Atlas SW painted and weathered as an NKP unit, and Joe Filipiak's

Atlas Alco S2. Joe noted he had found the prototype's builders plate at a flea market and used it as the inspiration to research and model this unit. 1st place Diorama went to John Puch with a freelanced Proto 2000 SW8 modeled for his home railroad, 2nd place to George Keller with a SW2 NKP unit, tied for 3rd place were John Witt's Diesel Refueling Facility and Dave Lawler's Atlas Alco S2 towing a totally scratchbuilt brass transfer caboose, followed by Don Glass's "very small" Jordan Mack diesel. During the Bring 'N Brag portion, Bram Bailey stated he had his recently published book available to look at as well as a few copies available to purchase (free autograph included - Editor). Next month's contest will be SMALL TOWN BANK. Contestants wishing to have their models judged for the AP certificate should bring their paperwork, available on the NMRA website.

Company Store Chair Scott Benson reported he will be selling the Division's Davies Steel hopper cars at the upcoming Region Convention. Scott also reported he had a selection of reefers, school houses, patches and hats for sale. Scot noted the free to members DVD's available to borrow.

Raffle Chair Adam Woodie noted the night's raffle theme was Spring Cleaning, with a little bit of everything available to choose from by the lucky winners.

Assistant Superintendent Ron Morgan discussed the potential field trip to the Oil Creek& Titusville Railroad in Titusville, PA. The plan is to charter a bus with seating for 54. The package will include the bus ride, a box lunch, train ticket and ticket to the nearby Drake Well Museum. The Division will supplement the cost of the trip in the amount of \$1,936.80 and members paying \$20 per seat. A stop for supper on the return trip is planned with the cost paid by the individual members. As the funds are outside the approved annual budget, a motion to approve the expenditure was made by Gary Shaefer and seconded by Fred Wagner. Motion passed with no votes cast against the request. The trip is set for Saturday, October 12th. A signup sheet was available. A final count will be needed by August. The trip is currently open to members and spouses. More detailed information will follow.

Under New Business, members of the Medina County 4H club spoke to the members. They originally planned

to show slides of their recent show, but the individual with the slides was in an auto accident and unavailable. They thanked the Division very much for the support shown, including a recent donated estate that was given to them through the Division. They will be again displaying their modules at the Medina County fair, July 29 – August 4, with an expected 34 modules. Division 4 members are invited to view their efforts and vote on their favorite module. The Division will then hold a drawing of members who voted with the winner of the drawing receiving a locomotive.

Director Brian Haas reported the Directors held their required annual meeting at 7 PM. The purpose of the annual meeting is to provide members with a outlet for raising concerns or making suggested improvements to how the Division is operated. No concerns or suggestions were raised. Brian all directors are available anytime to discuss members' concerns and improvement ideas.

Superintendent Sheffield noted the upcoming Regional Convention will be in nearby Boardman, Ohio, hosted by Division 1. Lee also stated he found accommodations at the Days Inn across the street from the host hotel for a significant cost reduction.

Larry Kosinski will be coordinating the Summer Picnic, to be held at the Northern Ohio Live Steamers in Lester, Ohio on Saturday, August 10th.

Gary Shaefer reported the Lorain Growth Association will be seeking grants to locate a caboose to their park in downtown Lorain. The caboose has already been donated by CSX and delivered to a nearby siding. The display track needs to be funded and installed followed by trucking the caboose to its new home. It is estimated the total cost to be \$10,000. Joe Filipiak told an amusing anecdote of the efforts to procure a caboose for Grafton.

Joe Kurilec, MMR, asked members to show their appreciation of all the work done by Division 4's leadership and numerous Chairs on the members' behalf. An enthusiastic round of applause supported Joe's comment.

George Keller provided an update on the 757 locomotive, now at the Mad River & NKP Railroad Museum in Bellevue. The museum's BOD just authorized the expenditure of \$207,000 for a building to house the locomotive and other pieces. A light cosmetic restoration is planned for the 757 this


summer.

Ron Morgan reminded everyone the CV & WS Model Railroad club will be hosting open houses from 11 AM to 4 PM each day, April 27-28 and May 4-5. Donations will help refill their treasury after depletion from the cost of a new roof.



While working on my layout, I discovered that I built too many structures to fit the area intended for them! Bad planning on my part....but that did give me the option (excuse) to expand the switching layout several feet!

I like Micro Engineering's code 70 flex track but once curved it is hard to get it straight or change the curve. I do have some Fast Tracks wood "alignment gauges" that help, but it still is a problem.

Somewhere I remembered about a flexible ruler that I could be used to test fit tracks in industrial settings before placement of a structure.

I located flexible rulers online. I figured they would be at Lowe's or Home Depot locally. Nope! So it was on to the craft stores.

I found one at Joann Fabric and Craft Store...in the Quilting area! That brand was EZ Quilting with a length of 20 inches. It worked OK but seemed to be too rigid. While doing errands I saw a Michaels Craft Store. There I found another

brand, Staedtler flexible curve ruler. This one was 18 inches long and seemed to work much better for my needs.



# HOW TO PRINT THE FLATWHEEL

Our *Flatwheel* has grown over the years from a couple paged "mimeographed" hard copy newsletter to the current 40 +/- page electronic publication. Being all electronic has numerous advantages; zero cost to publish vs. postage costs and no cost full color vs. maybe a color photo printed on occasion, as well as readily available anytime, any place using your favorite electronic device, PC, laptop, tablet and/or smart phone. And no volunteer time stapling, folding and addressing two hundred plus copies as our past editors (and at least one wife) had to do.

However, with the advantages, there are of course disadvantages. Personally, I still prefer reading books and magazines the "old fashion way"...on paper. I also still collect my railroad magazines on a shelf where they are readily available to scour for that article I want to reread.

You can print *The Flatwheel* on your home printer but at 40 + color pages, it is not inexpensive to do and takes a little time. You could also take the PDF file to your nearby office supply store and have them print it. Again, it would not be inexpensive, but it is an option.

Recently it came to my attention that some members may wish to only print a specific article from *The Flatwheel* rather than the full edition. As your Editor, I thank you and our authors that you find content worthy of saving in this manner.


So how can you print a select portion of a PDF file such as *The Flatwheel*?

First you will want to open the PDF file using a PDF reader. I use Adobe Acrobat Reader DC. This is the gold standard of such programs and is available for free. Go to

https://get.adobe.com/reader/otherversions/,


select the operating system you are using, the lanquage you are most comfortable with and the version (Reader DC 2019.010.20099.English for Windows in my example below), then click on the big yellow DOWNLOAD Now button. Follow the prompts and you should be good to go.

The following photos show the steps needed to download the reader, if needed, and to print a select set of pages using Adobe. If you use another reader, your steps may be different.




This is the screen you will see when you go to https://get.adobe.com/reader/otherversions/ to download Adobe Reader DC. The three buttons on the left show the choices I made to download the program to my Windows 10 laptop.


file open in Adobe **Acrobat** Reader DC, click on the printer icon.



After clicking on the PRINTER icon, the adjacent dialogue box will open. This is the default, with "ALL Pages to Print" selected. At this point if you hit the PRINT button, you will print the full version.



If you only wish to print certain pages, click "PAGES" and put the page range you wish to print. In the example on the right, I selected pages 19-21, allowing me to only print the great article on the Cleveland Stockyards by Joe Kurilec, MMR in the April issue. Now when you hit PRINT you will have a hard copy of only loe's article.

I hope you'll find these interesting.




Reading 2100 took a ride on the turntable so that her nose was to the front of the roundhouse doors.

# ORGANIZATION IS JUST ANOTHER TOOL


Tools are designed to make us productive in our chosen discipline and/or improve the quality of our product. Tools I value highly provide the most improvement in both the quality and quantity of my modeling efforts.

While many may not categorize "organization" with the subject of tools, I definitely do. In my professional career, my many home renovation projects and in my model railroading efforts, my output drops dramatically when I become unorganized.

Years ago I modified an old computer desk to act as my hobby work bench. I added slide out trays to hold wood and plastic strip stock, plastic and metal shapes and other items used in modeling. It worked pretty well.

We moved into our current home six years ago. One of the first things I did while settling in was to set up my hobby work space. My old computer desk/work bench was put to work and continues to do a good job. The actual work surface is 36" wide x 36" deep. The width is more than sufficient for the HO scale modeling I recently perform. I added some small drawers and a foam tool rack along the rear reducing the work surface depth to 18". I think this shows you don't need a large bench area to do the type of modeling most of us do.

The following pictures show better than I can explain the way my tools are organized.



This overview highlights a number of features I have included in my workshop. In the foreground is the top edge of my paint spray booth allowing me to turn 180 degrees and be ready to paint. Note the white "floor". This is a piece of 3/4" solid plastic sheet that allows me to find those little items that I too often drop on the floor. Continue to the next page to see more details.



The tall section on the lower left has slide out trays I use to hold my wood and styrene strip stock, plastic and metal shapes and other scratch building materials.



Inexpensive stackable plastic drawers on the top left hold numerous tools. While used less often, I still need to "find" them when I need them, hence the labels





Sitting on top of the low frequency use tools are several metal boxes with small jars inside. These hold the numerous screws, nuts, washers and nails used in model construction. Note in addition to screw sizes, tap and clearance drill information is included, saving time vs. looking it up each time.







Recently I made a much needed improvement. Prior to this I placed my numerous adhesives in this cubby hole. But they were loose, fell over, I couldn't see the one I wanted, etc. I added two roll out shelves in this deep "cubby hole" left of the work top. Now the items are in holes melted into a piece of 1" foam allowing me to easily find what I need AND leaving enough room under it for a second shelf I now use for my soldering needs.



My most frequently used tools are in place closest to and directly behind the work surface. The recently added plastic stacking trays give me a place for items I use frequently but did not have a good place to store.

I had a foam tool tray that was getting pretty battered so I made a new, three tier unit. Before melting holes I went through my tools with the "do I use this often, or not"mantra in mind. This helped me put away a few I had in the old tray that I really didn't use much. I also added some tools that I found myself digging out of the less often used tool storage area on a regular basis. I now have a good selection readily available to use when I need them.






