The North Coast Division holds 10 meetings a year (none in July and August). Meetings are on the 2nd Friday of each month. A






The most recent concern was the desire by a member to be able to get a hard copy of a specific article. I wrote on this topic in an in-depth article in the May 2019 *Flatwheel* but will repeat again for those who missed my prose.

You can print to any printer the entire *Flatwheel* by simply clicking on the **PRINT** icon in your PDF reader, then in the dialogue box that will open again click on **PRINT**.

You can also print only the pages you wish to have a hard copy. To do so, again click on the **PRINT** icon. When the

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print dialogue box pops up you will see a section titled **PAGES TO PRINT**. Use the **PAGES** section to input the



range of pages you wish to print; EXAMPLE: 13-17. Then click on the **PRINT** button.

I have been your editor soon to be 3 years. Past Editor Dave Williams held this position for 10 years. YOU can be our next editor by simply telling Lee, or myself, you would like to try your hand at it. It is easy and only a little time consuming.

NMRA MCR Division 4 General Meeting Minutes for Friday, October 11, 2019 Church of the Redeemer, Westlake Ohio

The meeting was called to order by Superintendent Lee Sheffield at 7:30 pm. A moment of silence was observed in memory of Jim Moore, Rich Tressa and other recently deceased members.

The September meeting Minutes were presented for corrections or changes and were approved as published in the *Flatwheel*.

Treasurer Greg Noeth presented a brief financial statement. The Fair Board has been paid for the Train Show. Some Show related bills are still being finalized.

Membership Chair George Keller reported on his efforts to bring the name badges up to date. He then requested all new members and visitors to introduce themselves.

Clinic Chair Larry Madson stated that the evening's clinic would be on 3D Printing presented by Bruce Bowie. In November, Chuck Klein will give his clinic on the Terminal Tower. Clinic presenters are requested for next year (January through June).

Modular Group Chair Adam Woodie gave an account of recent modular group activities, along with upcoming events. Those events include Division 4's TRAINing Day, the holiday display at the Cleveland Zoo, and Trees and Trains in Lorain. Volunteers are needed for all events, and all Division members are welcome to participate.

PRR T1 rises in St. Louis

Boiler courses are coming together for the lost duplex

Gary Bensman walks through Continental Fabricators in St. Louis, holding a washout plug for the boiler of Pennsylvania Railroad T1 No. 5550. Bensman grips the plug much like a judge would hold a gavel, as he holds court over the fabrication of the boiler for a locomotive class whose last member of 52 fell to the scrapper's torch by 1956.

The new Pennsylvania T1 4-4-4-4 steam locomotive is being built by the nonprofit group, The Pennsylvania Railroad T1 Steam Locomotive Trust Inc.

The trust is using Bensman's experience to produce the boiler that's the heart of the T1. Bensman, 62, owns Diversified Rail Services and is overseeing construction of the pressure vessel, a 3½ course boiler, and smokebox.

The first and second boiler courses (or sections) of No. 5550 sit next to a new boiler being manufactured for Mid-Continent Railway Museum's former Chicago & North Western 4-6-0 No. 1385 and other projects that are in the shop. The 1385 project is easily recognized as a locomotive, but the T1 boiler start looks more like a highway culvert.

The T1 group has already built the prow and cast drive wheels. Visitors have the opportunity to learn more about the project and donate toward the purchase of a section of a Boxpok driver wheel at prrt1 steamlocomotivetrust.org/station.

Bensman is visibly proud of the work he is doing to bring back a monster of steam days. "This is a realistic and believable project, \$20 million and a 20-year mission."







November is National Model Railroad Month. In support of this event my UP Sherman Hill layout will be open:

Saturday November 16 from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM

Sunday November 17 from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM

My home is near the intersection of State Routes 2 and 306.

For those of you who have not seen it, here is a description of the layout:

Depicts 40 miles of the Union Pacific Railroad in Southeastern Wyoming (Cheyenne to the Hermosa Tunnel)

Uses the majority of my 66' x 33' basement

Current equipment on the layout is from the 1950's era (steam, diesel, turbine)

Scenery is about 90% complete

Many scratch built structures in Cheyenne: depot, freight station, roundhouse, backshop, yard tower

Owney and the Railways Mail - by Larry Oliver

A Border Terrier, an orphan and abandoned, of uncertain age, wandered into a post office in Albany, New York in 1888. It was cold and he soon settled into a comfortable position on some mail bags. He was scruffy and had obviously been on the streets for some time, and this may have been the first warm bed in a long time.



Most people love a dog, and this one immediately won the affection of the mail clerks in the office. He was mild-mannered and loved the affection - and the food - that the clerks gave him. His love of the mail bags as a bed was endearing, and led to some long-term and widespread adventures.

The Albany Post Office daily carried mail to the railway stations, and the dog accompanied them on the trips. By this time, he had acquired the name of "Owney". How that name was chosen is a subject of myth, with numerous speculations in

the various literature that surrounds the dog. It is clear that the clerks in Albany named him, for they had a collar and name tag for him with that name on it.

And it was a good thing Owney had that collar and name tag because his introduction to the Railway Mail Service set a pattern that made him a legend. Owney had "adopted" the railroads as his home away from Albany, and was soon hopping rides in the mail cars. The railway mail clerks took to Owney just as the Albany clerks had, and fed him, gave him water, and loved him and his companionship on their trips while sorting the mail. Owney always slept on the mail bags, with the clerks gently moving him when they needed to open a bag.

It was not long before his travels, first around New York, then far afield around the entire US, gathered attention and adoration. People - not just postal clerks - began adding trinkets to his collar to indicate where he had traveled. A sort of postal charm bracelet! HIs travels extended to almost every state in the US, and as his collar became too laden with trinkets, the postal clerks would remove some and mail them back to Albany for safekeeping.

John Wanamaker was Postmaster General at the time, and he had a special harness made for Owney to hold the trinkets to relieve the load on his collar.

Owney literally traveled around the world in 1895. In Tacoma, Washington, he boarded a steamship bound for the Orient. He visited China and Japan, collecting trinkets along the way. He even acquired a special postal classification called "Registered Dog Package". The round-the-world tour took 132 days, going from west to east.

Owney traveled over 140,000 miles during his sojourn as a Railway mail mascot. He visited several thousand cities and accumulated over 1,000 trinkets and medals. He was greeted by crowds at most places in the last 6-7 years of his

life - his fame had spread widely.

There are several anecdotes that persist about his life and experiences. The most credible of which include his jumping off a train when a mail bag fell off as it was leaving a station and staying with the bag until it was retrieved. He was given a passport when he arrived in Japan.

That he was loved is not in question. Such an experience could not be duplicated today for a variety of reasons, notwithstanding the multiple restrictive regulations under which the USPS operates.

He was honored with a US stamp, Scott 4547 in 2011.

He died in 1897 while on a trip to Toledo, Ohio. His body was collected and is now preserved, along with his harness and the medals, in the Smithsonian Postal Museum in Washington, DC. All dog lovers should see it.



The museum had a replica building on the same site as the original first well. Inside was a working steam powered pump. The pump would pull up a stream of oil and dump it into a nearby barrel as did the original. A museum docent was in the building and told the story of how this all came to be.



We stayed at the museum for 2 hours and then left for the train station. At the station our guide, Ron,



gave each of us 2nd class our ticket for the train ride. We stood in line behind the 1st class passengers at the west end of the station. Once we were boarded, the railroad then allowed the coach passengers to board. There were 10 cars on our train and it filled with passengers.

The train traveled for 1 1/2 hours following Oil Creek through the valley. Sadly, our warm fall delayed the fall colors. Still, it was a very scenic ride. At the far end we disembarked to stretch our legs. Many of us (myslef included) went into the small station and got a little ice cream to eat.

We again boarded the train for the return 1 1/2 hour trip. Upon our return, we got on our bus and headed home. We stopped at the Austintown, OH Cracker Barrel for a pleasant supper. Supper was the only expense not included in our package.







I like to write railroad articles. Many times I just can't get the right position for maps to be photographed and digitized for publishing. I needed a large surface to hang items for a photo shoot using a tripod.

As I looked around the house for something to mount maps on I saw the flat screen TV. It was not in use so I gave it a try.

I used clear tape to attach the map to the front of the TV. A few test images showed that I needed some "filler" at the bottom of the map.

White card stock from Marc's filled the bill. I added a date of the map and now could take images of the map.



My tripod is to the left. I adjusted the tripod to get the best angle needed to shoot the image. To the right is a Bruce Bowie "tip". He found this LED light for under \$100.00 to be used in his paint booth.

I also used his idea but found another use. GREAT lighting for picture taking!

I noticed that by hanging a colored background over the TV and placing models to be photographed on a small table in front of the TV made a very easy way to get good shots of models.

The LED light is to the right. I found a \$5.00 tripod in Marc's closeout department making the LED light easy to adjust in many positions that are sometime needed during photo shoots.
