WHEN & WHERE WE MEET





application of pre-printed decals to expand a fleet of cars to 12 numbers. Price is REDUCED to \$17 each.



ADDING 'REAL' COAL USING STOCK COAL LOADS ON A SIMPLE FIXTURE

Many of todays ready to run, super detailed hopper cars come with a plastic load that is placed inside the hopper car.

I found away to easily glue coal to these inserts making them more real and without a making a mess.

Finding foam squares with double sided glue on two sides at craft stores got me to thinking. These are used to add printed material to foam board or to glue special promotion items. I thought these could be use to hold hopper loads when adding real coal to make the loads better looking.


Laying the plastic load on a flat surface, painting on glue and pouring coal on to the wet glue always made a mess.

Most times the plastic load would stick to the surface.

Building a small fixture to hold the plastic loads in place when adding coal was an easy project. It took no longer then 5 minutes to make this simple fixture.




Peel off the protective paper on these foam squares allows you to glue the foam in a plastic "tray". These squares were pre-cut.



I usually save all types containers that model scenery are packaged in. There are many uses for this type of plastic package around the layout. They are very handy when dry brushing weathering powders. The excess powder falls into the tray for easy re-use.

Mixing several colors together makes some interesting weathering powders!



I used a Woodland Scenics plastic package tray as the base to my fixture. A box from a kit would work just as well.

With the foam glued to the tray, I peeled off the top protection paper to expose the glue.

This would hold the stock plastic coal load in place. Depending on the length of your hopper car, make sure your tray is "long" enough for the load.

I then attach the plastic load on to the sticky foam which holds it in place. Using a brush I paint white glue over all of the plastic load.

Its pretty easy to control the amount of glue being painted on. Should glue drip on to the tray you can wipe it off or just leave it alone.

Making another fixture is fast. You might make a couple of these if you have several loads to do.



Pour scenic coal over the white glue and let it dry. Loose coal falls into the tray and can be re-used. Once dry, check to see if all of the plastic

is covered with coal. Use a little more white glue to touch up areas missed.

Pour on more coal. You also can use more white glue to increase the height of the coal pile. Each load will be a little different and unique. Dulcoat spray can or air brushed weathering along with dry brushed weathering pigments will finish off the looks of the load.

Keep in mind there are several "sizes" of scenic coal. Fine to large "chunks". Iron ore and many types of gravel or ballast can also be used to make several different of loads.

For cars without loads, simply use balsa or basswood cut to fit the inside the car. Use some strip-wood to make the needed mounts for your loads. Paint with white glue and pour on the coal.

While doing some railroad research around the Carter Road lift bridge I found some interesting items and wanted to share them with Division 4 members.

This area was once the north end of DK yards. I found a 1950s picture of this area and became intrigued and wanted to learn more.

Since we go to the West Side Market every Saturday it was just a hop, skip and a six pack to Carter Road.

On a 1934 map, DK yards (New York Central) had eight tracks with a capacity of 366 cars. No passenger cars were stored here.



Looking north on Carter Road shows the road lift bridge. To the left of the road bridge is the railroad lift bridge. At the top right you'll see the US District Courthouse just peaking out. The Terminal Tower is also to the right.



If we turn to the left (west) on Carter Road DK Tower comes into view. This image was taken in 8-2016. Very overgrown.

Today I got real lucky. For some reason the tower area was cleaned up. This made it easy to get some good images.

Notice the stairway leading to the top of the tower..... as Lee Vandevisse (deceased), past Division Super always told me "no one ever accused me of being smart!" That will be another story for the Nickel Plate Road Historical Technical Society magazine.



From DK tower turning right (north) the massive railroad lift bridge comes into view. The chain links on the counter weights are large!



As I looked at the old railroad ties still in place I noticed an electric switch motor to the right of the ties.

Here is the point of this article. In 2016 I could not see the switch motor as everything was overgrown. The gear mechanism and components made an interesting study.


to pull the consist. I would imagine this kept the loco crew well ahead of the chemicals used.

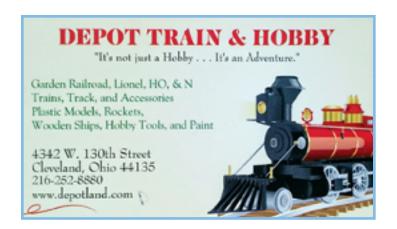




