
are welcome to attend any meeting.

BOD MEETING MINUTES

NMRA MCR Division 4 BOD Meeting Minutes May 5, 2020

The meeting was conducted online via Zoom.

In attendance online: Lee Sheffield, Ron Morgan, Greg Noeth, David Williams, Joe Kurilec MMR, Larry Madson, Steve Kaplan, David James (meeting host), Ben Lanza, Scott Benson, Gary Schaefer, Frank Bongiovanni, Jeff Lauren, Fred Wagner, Adam Woodie, Chuck Shick, Chris Shick, Fred Obreza, Larry Kuczynski, Bruce Bowie, Brian Haas, George Keller.

Note: This meeting conducted while the state of Ohio remains locked down due to the Covid 19 pandemic. This situation, with no clear indication of when restrictions will be lifted, played a significant role in decisions, with many necessarily postponed.

Lee Sheffield called the meeting to order at 7:09 pm. A brief discussion was held concerning the possibility of having a June meeting. It was decided to be unlikely as church availability remains unknown and many members might be reluctant to attend. (NOTE - It was later in May decided the June meeting was canceled - *Editor*)

Ben Lanza and Joe Kurilec MMR[®] were recognized for their continuing email series to members and others titled "For Division 4 Members Stuck at Home". The series has provided almost daily news, photos, articles and contests. It has been noted at Regional and National levels. Thanks was given also to other contributing members.

Great Berea Train Show Chair David James stated that plans for the October show were proceeding. The Fair Board has guaranteed our weekend, but contracts are not currently available. We have also secured the first full weekend in October for 2021 and 2022. Agreements for this year will include a provision for full refund to us in the event the Fairgrounds are unavailable due to Covid-19. Our current expenses are very low. We will need to provide sanitation stations and safety signage, to be specifically determined within two weeks of the Show. David will send out letters to Show vendors requesting table deposits, with the understanding that full refunds will be given if the Show is canceled.

Modular Group Chair Adam Woodie said that scheduled upcoming events, to include the Cuyahoga County Fair, Oktoberfest, and Group meetings are all in a "wait and see" status.

Larry Kuczynski related that the Division picnic is still moving forward with the idea that the facility provides adequate opportunities for proper distancing. Whether or not the park will be open is a primary question. Supplies can be purchased shortly before the event.

Layout Chair Ron Morgan initially stated that he intended to cancel upcoming tours. He was persuaded to consider postponing the tours until later in the year if deemed to be held in a

manner safe for owners and visitors.

Venues are being researched for the December Awards Banquet.

Training Day Chair Gary Schaefer stated that TRAINing Day and the *Trees and Trains* holiday event are currently on hold. Gary questioned whether or not he should order material in preparation for Training Day, and it was agreed that purchasing should proceed as items could be stored until next year if necessary.

Lee said that we have an agreement with the Westlake Recreation Center for our new meeting room for September/October/November of this year (if the Center is open). The meeting room is large enough to accommodate our usual attendance with adequate distancing if necessary.

Lee reminded everyone that Larry Madson is stepping down as Clinic Chair very soon and we need his replacement to step forward. Lee also spoke of the *Flatwheel* Editor transition from Bruce Bowie to Chuck Shick, and Secretary transition from Dave Williams to Chris Shick. Lee directed these people to communicate as necessary to complete smooth transitions.


Lorain's Caboose Update



CONTEST TABLE

The model contests that were held during our division meetings from the later part of 2019 into early 2020 numbered a total of five contests. Since the majority of the contests have been held, we will recognize the efforts of our members with awards and prizes at our next meeting.

So now let's talk about the new season and the subjects for the contests. The last three contests from the 2019 - 2020 season will become the first three contest subject matters for the new season. The first contest will be a load on a flat car. The second contest will be a sleeper passenger car, any road, any era, from early heavy weights to today's Amtrak. The third contest is a rubber wheeled railroad vehicle. Number four of the contests is to be a typical commercial building found in the business district within one block of the railroad. Number five is LARGE motive power (non-steam). No yard or four axle road switchers. The sixth contest is to be an RPO car. Number seven is a small country railroad station. The final contest of the session is a rail car lettered for a short line railroad. The railroad has to be a real railroad that once existed or is still in business today.

As the pandemic continues to play havoc with our ability to meet, socialize and share, this month we are continuing the theme of sharing what you have been using the extra time most of us have to do in our great hobby.

From John Hemsath, MMR®


On one of the buildings, I wanted to represent peeling paint. First I sprayed on the brick color. When dry, I wet the brick with water and sprinkled on Cream of Wheat. When dry I sprayed on the final color. When that was dry, I just brushed off the cereal. Artists call this a resist. It's important that the final paint be lacquer or enamel. If it is water base, it would dissolve the Cream of Wheat and it would stick like glue to the brick. I learned this the hard way.



Who hasn't thought of using a few Revell engine houses to make a factory? John Puch has one on his layout. Over the years I've collected articles and photos on the subject. Back in 2011, I bought 9 of the kits on eBay. This month I finally started the factory. It will be the Iron Fireman Co. which had a facility in Cleveland. I cut up the walls on my 4" Dremel table saw, and sanded the wall joints on a small stationary disk sander that brother Tom had given me. After I cut up the plastic, I got curious about when I actually got the kits. I keep an inventory of model railroad stuff and when I totaled up what the cost came to for these 9 kits, I was appalled and embarrassed. It's not so bad when you're buying them one at time, but holy cow! Then I thought of what a craftsman kit costs and I felt a little better. Still, I won't be doing anything like that again. This building better turn out pretty darn good.





As promised, here is a picture of the two new boxcars. Both are Accurail kits. For both I used Kadee whisker couplers, proto wheel sets, Tichy running boards and either A-Line or Detail Associates stirrup steps. 


From John Puch

"Bet that never happened there before!"



Introduction

In 2016, my wife Margie and I decided to build a new home in Tampa, Florida. In Ohio, I operate the PRR Pittsburgh Division in my basement a couple times a year or so with my friends, many of whom are Division 4 members.

I have always enjoyed the PRR as my favorite railroad....so....after we moved into our Tampa home, Margie suggested that I build another layout in the upstairs bonus room which is approximately 19' x 22'. Thus, after some research and a great article in the Keystone Magazine (PRR&HS) regarding the Clearfield Branch, specifically Phillipsburg, I chose to model this portion of the PRR in the 50's. My legs and body would not let me build anything close to the PRR Pittsburgh Division in Ohio, so I chose light weight benchwork, no grades and easy printed backdrops but still give me operating choices that would be fun for approximately six or so operators. All the turnouts are hand thrown Peco's except for two that have Circuitron Switch motors because of distance from the fascia. These are controlled with Digitrax Throttles by the engineer.

In Ohio, operating sessions have evolved over time with as many as 16-20 operators running trains during a 4 hour schedule. I have always liked the idea of a Train Schedule, Car Cards with Waybills and an operating plan that is enjoyable for the operators that attend.

The Clearfield Branch is historical in it's existance. It began as the Tyrone and Clearfield RR in 1854 with little funding and impossible grades. Through time, the PRR knew that this railroad had potential to move huge carloads of Bituminous Coal to markets North, East and West.

The Tyrone and Clearfield RR was merged into the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1862 and the single track main line was completed from Vail, Pa to Osceola Mills, Pa. The PRR Bald Eagle Branch ran through Vail from Tyrone to Lock Haven, Pa. Soon thereafter, rails were laid to Phillipsburg, and on to Clearfield, Pa. The operation aspect was even more desirable to me as the New York Central interchanged with the PRR in Phillipsburg and Clearfield with connections to Newberry Jct. and Lock Haven, Pa. The PRR extended the mainline to Grampian but many branches were added throughout central Pennsylvania including the Moshannon Branch, Coal Run Branch and Muddy Run

Branch. Osceola Mills was important as the Elliot Coal Prep plant was located there and coal was processed and shipped to major cities.

I designed a track plan to fit the available 19" x 22" bonus room space. I started the benchwork last year and Osceola and the Moshannon Branch were completed first. There are staging yards at each end point that are were easy to build, hidden from operators view and are geographically correct in the operating plan. Track Plan to follow.

Since this is my first article about the Clearfield Branch, let's start with some photos of Osceola and the Moshannon Branch. We are in Florida for the "Stay at Home" mandate. I will share additional information and photos on the progress. Thanks for reading and please Stay Healthy!




Osceola, Pa. Yard tracks and Moshannon Branch tracks in foreground. Industrial and City in background. Backdrops photographed by author in Photoshop and printed on 24" removable vinyl. The 2" electrical chase along the facia makes stand-up wiring easier. It is then covered with 1" pink foam insulation board press fit into area. It will be painted and covered with ground cover, but could be removed at later time if needed.

Elliot Coal Prep Plant, Osceola, Pa. There are four tracks serving the Elliot Coal Company in Osceloa Mills, Pa. The first two tracks and hidden from view closest to box cars are for out-going coal shipping. The single track in center is for incoming coal processing. The fourth (furthest) track with conveyor is for Slack Coal shipping.




