

#### THIS GREAT TOOL HAS MANY USES

On a trip to Harbor Freight to "look around" I found this VERY useful table vise. I needed a vise that would fit my table (1/1/2)".



This model (item 97160) which sells for \$21.99 fit my needs. The table clamp fits up to 1 5/8" thick tables. Perfect.

The vise also can be set to almost any angle! It swivels 360° and so do the vise jaws! Note that the vise jaws rotate.

One side is smooth jaws and the other has a grip jaw that can clamp shapes.

I use the vise to hold models when adding details. This really works out as the model is clamped firmly. Its like having a third arm that is rigid! This helps as both of my hands "move on their own" and I can "try" to focus my eyes! FYI: don't get old! I thought it would take longer!

Here I have clamped an old Ambroid poultry car kit. These were "state of the art" models years ago. As I was building the kit I had the idea of building a car repair area on the layout. I have added worker and lumber inside and on the roof.

I also will have a welding area in this mini scene complete with welders using LEDs for the "arcs". What is great about this project is that it uses a small foot print on the layout and will have a ton of details added. These can be easily viewed as the models will be close to the edge of the layout.

## The U.S. MILITARY RAILROAD Spain James

#### The U.S. Military Railroad

#### A Photographic Record of Railroads in the Civil War

The American Civil War (ACW) is, in some ways, the first modern war. The use of telegraphy, aerial observation, submarines, photography, iron clad ships and railroads foretold the future and greatly extended the ability to wreak mayhem and death on the enemy.

This series focuses on the railroad aspect, based on photos. An occasional bit of history may creep in, but the pictures and rails the are the main event.

The ACW was not the first war with railroads; that would be the Crimean War (Half a league, half a league, half a league onward). It was, though, the first time that the military incorporated railroads to assure that they were built and operated to facilitate strategy. They even made Herman Haupt, chief engineer on the Pennsy, then on the Hoosac Tunnel project, a general to head the railway effort.

Of course, locomotives always head up the train.

#### U.S. Military Railroad Locomotives

The Union Army bought both new and used locomotives, as well as capturing some from Confederate railroads, and borrowing a few from northern roads. During the course of the war, they had over three hundred locomotives on their roster, coming from an amazing variety of firms. Rather than a complete roster, here is a list of builders, although a few may have been missed.

- M. W. Baldwin & Company of Philadelphia had both new and used locomotives in the service.
- Cuyahoga Steam Furnace Company, in Cleveland, Ohio, had one used locomotive in military service, but was a major supplier of rail during the war, since they had backed out of locomotive manufacturing.
- Danforth, Cooke & Company, of Paterson, New Jersey, provided new locomotives and eventually joined Alco.
- Hinkley & Williams and Hinkley & Drury were predecessors to Hinkley Locomotive Works of Boston, Massachusetts. H&W provided new locomotives and H&D locos were used when acquired.
- Lawrence Machine Shop, of Lawrence, Massachusetts, made locomotives in the 1850s, some of which were used by the military.
- Manchester Locomotive Works in Manchester, New Hampshire, acquired


- Amoskeag Locomotive Works just before the Civil War and eventually became part of Alco. Manchester provided new locomotives; used Amoskeag units were also purchased.
- Mason Machine Works, located in Taunton, Massachusetts, produced new locomotives for the Military Railroad.
- Moore & Richardson (AKA Cincinnati Locomotive Works), of Cincinnati, Ohio had its locomotives taken into the war, but closed shortly after the south was defeated.
- New Castle Manufacturing Comany, of New Castle, New Jersey built engines between 1834–58; some of them came into the military.
- Niles & Company, in Cincinnati, Ohio, built locomotives prior to the war. It is not related to the interurban builder, Niles Car and Manufacturing Company.
- Portland Company, of Portland, Maine built a number of locomotives for the military, and is probably best known for its two foot gauge locomotives.
- Richard Norris and Son, of Philadelphia, had a number of both new and used locomotives in the service, although the firm closed shortly after the war.
- Rogers, Ketchum and Grosvenor, of Paterson, New Jersey, became Rogers
  Locomotive and Machine Works, joining the Alco conglomerate. They provided
  both new and used locomotives.
- Ross Winans was a progressive but stubborn builder who built locos, many for the B & O, until shortly before the war. One of his locomotives became part of the U.S.M.R.R.
- Schenectady Locomotive Works, of Schenectady, New York, was one of the contractors providing new locomotives. The company survived to become a part of Alco.
- Seth Wilmarth, of South Boston, Massachusetts, built locomotives before the war.
- Smith & Perkins Locomotive Works and Virginia Locomotive & Car Works were essentially the same company in Alexandria, Virginia. Each was represented among the used locomotives military rail service.
- Souther, better known as Globe Locomotive Works, in South Boston, Massachusetts, did not last until the end of the war, but its locomotives contributed.
- Swinburne, Smith & Company, whose used locomotives joined the army, became New Jersey Locomotive and Machine Company, a provider of new locomotives. They were located in Paterson, New Jersey.
- Taunton Locomotive Manufacturing Company, of Taunton, Massachusetts, also provided new locomotives for the war effort, but did not survive into the twentieth century.



Trains had it rough in the war. Here is Rapidan, a Virginia Locomotive and Car Works ten-wheeler from 1856. It's pulling two unidentifiable locomotives back to be repaired somewhere in northern Virginia. The two derelicts were caught in a Confederate raid; it appears that the rear one was simply burned and pummeled, while the nearer locomotive was also up ended. It seems likely that the trees in the forground were cut down to make cribbing and levers to put the locomotives on the tracks. Also, note the timber beam trucks on the USMRR flat car. That was the most common truck construction at the time.




This is Gen'l Haupt, named after the general in charge of the Union railways. Most of the USMRR locomotives in Virginia went by name, not number. This general was an 1863 American produced by Mason Machine Works. It weighed in at 55,000 pounds and had 60 inch drivers.



W. H. Whiton, built by Richard Norris and Son in 1862, was, like most locomotives at the time, a 4-4-0. It weighed 57,910 pounds and had 56 inch drivers. History doesn't say too much about Mr. Whiton, except that he was the son-in-law of the first president of the New York and Erie Railroad.



This is Bernard Kempinski's O Scale model of W. H. Whiton. If you're interested in Civil War modeling, I strongly recommend his "United States Military Railroad" blog (https://usmrr.blogspot.com/). Spoiler alert: You've probably seen his books; I've bought a couple.



E.M. Stanton was built by Richard Norris and Son in 1862, although this picture was taken in 1864, showing the effort put into maintaining locomotives. Edwin Stanton was Lincoln's Secretary of War. This 59,850 pound ten-wheeler had 48" drivers.



In the western theater, locomotives were predominantly called by number instead of names. This is number 133, an American from Danforth Cooke & Company, weighing 60, 000 and riding on sixty inch drivers.



Much of Richmond, Virginia was burned when the Confederates evacuated the city. This locomotive was discovered among the ashes. The steam dome and the slanted cylinders suggest that it was a Rogers product, but it's difficult to say for sure.



J. H. Devereux, a New Jersey Locomotive and Machine Company product, was built in 1862 with 60 inch drivers and a weight of 52,000 pounds. John Henry Devereux worked in Cleveland as a construction engineer on the Cleveland, Columbus & Cincinnati and the Cleveland, Painesville & Ashtabula Railroads. In 1862 he was the colonel in charge of all Union rail lines in Virginia, Shown in Alexandria, Virgina.



The museum is easy to find. Go south on I-71. Take the 224 Exit west to Lake Road (19). Turn right on Buffham Road. The museum will be on the left.






