In the last contest article in the Flat Wheel, I said that the new list of contest challenges for the 2021 - 2022 season would be in this article, so here they are. The September contest asks for an interesting tank car from the era you are modeling or simply a tank car that you find interesting. The October contest is looking for a small, steam powered switch engine. The type you would find in freight yards or industries but not on the head end of a fast freight on the main line. November's contest subject is about something that all railroads have and still do use for traction. Sand facilities are always found around engine service areas, whether it's old time steam or todays diesels. Getting traction on slippery rails is made possible with sand. So let's see what you come up with as a sanding facility. January will give you a chance to build a small, rural railroad station. Depending on the railroad and its location, the designs can be unique and varied. February's contest is asking for an R.P.O. (railroad post office) car. March is the "blank box car" contest. Blank box car bodies will be available at all the meetings at the Contest Table. You can have as many as you need at no cost to complete your model project. I can't wait to see what you end up doing with these box cars. April's contest is a grain hauling car. Forty foot box cars were the standard until covered hoppers came along. Let's see what you find interesting to haul grain in. Finally, the May contest is challenging you to show a piece of logging industry equipment that needs rail to move on, other than the locomotive.

Well, there you have it, that's the list of next seasons challenges. I hope that you find them varied enough and interesting enough to get your creative modeling juices flowing.

While doing some research I came across a couple of old images of the Depot Hobby building on West 130 th. Street. This gave me the idea to share it with the membership as this is one of the last hobby shops in our area!


While looking through The West Park Historical calendar, "Historic West 130th Street", I found the image below.

The Depot Hobby building started off as a farmhouse. It was built by Henry C. Peterjohn between 1898 and the 1900s. This image was around 1914.

This view of the Depot Hobby building shows West 130th Street in front of the building. Running on the right side of the street are the tracks of Cleveland, Southwestern & Columbus Railway.

The road to the far top left is Bellaire Road. Notice that the barn that was to the right of the building is now gone. At the top right of the image is the smoke stack at the Lindale yards. Date around 1930.

# THE B&O WEST 3<sup>rd</sup> ROUND HOUSE, CLEVELAND, OHIO FOLLOWING THE LINE WEST OUT OF THE FLATS.

#### PART 2

I have always been interested in the B&O West Third Round house in the Cleveland, Ohio flats. As I started to prepare this article, many areas along the B&O became more interesting and required more research. I am sure there are some errors or information that could not be located. One very important item missing is dates of some images.


Walking into the round house is like going back in time! As I put this article together, Editor Chuck sent me an email from the West 3rd. progress report. There is a lot of work being done. That sure is good news. Try to get to the round house and look around, volunteer your services or better yet make a donation!




These photos were taken before any of the "clean up" mentioned in the MWPS newsletter. This is the machine shop area used for restoring projects.



Walking from the machine shop into the round house is like going back to the 1940s. Here Reading 2100, a northern 4-8-4 is being restored by a firm from Columbus, Ohio. This loco has had a lot of work and replacement parts. It seems to be in pretty good shape. It also shares a bay with another steam engine. Ex Grand Trunk Western 2-8-2, 4070.



A long time work horse for the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad, 4070 is getting extensive restoration work. The MWPS newsletter stated that the cab is ready for sand blasting. Also note the new cinder block walls along with roof repairs. Many of the original wood supports are still in use.




In this 2019 view of the front of the round house you can see many of the cars and locomotives in the MWPS collection. Behind me are many more cars. The image below is taken sometime in the early 1950s.





Diesels were everywhere as steam was losing ground fast! Notice that the bridge in the 2019 view is not yet built. The round house has lost many of the support buildings, yet the old power house stack remains.

Lady Baltimore, a 4-4-4 wheel arrangement stalls on the turntable in front of the Clark Avenue yards West 3rd. Round house. This locomotive was used for the Cleveland-Wheeling passenger train. It only pulled two passenger cars. This was Lady Baltimore's last trains as she was not suited for heavier loads because of low tractive effort.

Going over to the turntable pit you still can see the builders plate. The Nichols Engineering Company. The turntable has been repaired and still works today!

#### A REAL TRACK GAUGE!



As many of you know I scan documents for the New York Central System Historical Society. <a href="https://nycshs.org/">https://nycshs.org/</a>

We are located on Engle Road in Middleburg Hts, Ohio.

Many of the drawings that come across my work station are super interesting. This one has got to be one of the best! This one example on why you should join the NYCSHS! The prototype plans, images and modeling info are fantastic. Our magazine, The Headlight is loaded with great prototype and modeling articles.

This track gauge was for the Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago & Saint Louis Railway, CCC&StLRY. The Big Four route. The drawing is dated 1/19/1909. Its too bad that there was not a coupler height gauge like the Kadee track gauge has! I do wonder who lifted this on to the track to gauge the rails!

#### **HOME LAYOUT PROGRESS**

**Bruce Bowie** 

HURON, OHIO: I am at the stage, finally, of placing track feeders on the upper level of my EBT v3.2. With the virus on the way out and vaccinations on the way up, I called the first work session in over a year of my local crew for Friday, April 30th. It felt really, really good having the guys over!

Two track gangs installed a bunch of feeders and a couple Tam Valley Frog Juicers. The Frog Juicers are about 1 1/4" square with a nearly flat bottom. We attach them with good double sided foam tape. I find our very own locally manufactured Duct brand to have the best stickiness.

One lesson learned the hard way on my last railroad was to have the layout power on and testing EVERY pair of track feeders prior to installation of any more. Easy to do and ensures they work prior to attaching to the track. Also when soldering the feeders to the track the power remains which would provide a telltale if any feeders are cross connected to the bus causing a short.

Near the end of the work session all of sudden EVERYTHING on the track power system started flashing, impacting EVERY power subdistrict. I have never seen such an issue.

#### **HOME LAYOUT PROGRESS**

My basic layout construction uses 1" Polyiso foam placed onto a steel 2x4 structure. The top layer of the Polyiso is a plastic sheet glued to the insulation board. The bottom layer is a reflective sheet glued to the insulation board. The bottom layer is CONDUCTIVE. Starting with the last items installed, investigation found the last Frog Juicer was attached with a lot of muscle which caused the connector pins to protrude through the foam tape and touch the CONDUCTIVE sheet causing a short.

Who would have thought to look there if we had installed a bunch of feeders and Frog Juicers before turning on the power and seeing/hearing we have a short? Not me! It could have taken days, or longer!!

The two photos show the "nearly" flat Frog Juicer bottom with the connector pins protruding. The second photo shows the offending Frog Juicer relocated to an adjacent wood support. You can see the Polyiso conductive bottom layer and where it tore off when I removed the offending Frog Juicer.




